A BY-LAW, 375,

To prohibit the sale of liquor in the Village of Omeme.

The Municipal Council of the Village of Omeme hereby enacts as follows:

1.—That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented, or other manufactured liquors is and shall be prohibited in every tavern, inn or other house or place of public entertainment in the said municipality, and the sale thereof, except by wholesale, is and shall be prohibited in every shop or place other than a house of public entertainment in the said municipality.

2.—That the vote of the electors of the said Village of Omeme, will be taken on the by-law by the deputy returning officers hereinafter named on Monday, the Sixth day of January, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Eight, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and continuing till five o'clock in the afternoon at the undermentioned places:

At BRADBURN HALL in the VILLAGE OF OMEMEE, and that GEO. A. BALFOUR be Returning Officer.

That on the 23rd day of December, A.D. 1907, at his office in the Village of Omeme, at the hour of Ten o'clock in the Forenoon the Reeve shall appoint in writing, signed by him self, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the clerk, and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this by-law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this by-law.

4.—That the Clerk of the said Municipal Council of the Village of Omeme shall attend at the Bradburn Hall at the hour of Ten o'clock in the forenoon on the Seventh day of January, A.D. 1908, to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.

5.—This By-law shall come into operation, and be of full force and effect on and after the first day of May next after the final passing thereof.

NO MONEY AND NO FRIENDS

A Sad Story of Consumption in a Canadian Town

The Local Hospital Unable to Care for the Patient, and the query is What to Do?

In a little booklet issued by the National Sanitarium Association, whose auspices has been established the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives, we have the story told of a sad case of consumption.

A young woman, apparently friendly, came in on a train reaching Fort William, and immediately procured work as a domestic. A doctor was called in to examine her case, as she appeared to be a consumptive, and she was at once pronounced a bad case of tuberculosis.

She was placed in the small local hospital of the town, and everything possible for the moment is being done to help the patient.

But writing to the Secretary of the National Sanitarium Association, the Secretary of the Board of Health asks: "Is it possible to make room for this patient in the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives? The local hospital is crowded for room, and there is really no place for this poor girl."

Continuing, the Fort William official adds: "I may say that as far as being able to pay is concerned, she, as far as we can learn, has no friends who can afford to pay for her in an institution."

It is to meet just such cases as these that the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives has been opened. The official reports of the past year show that more than half the patients who entered the institution were absolutely free—their maintenance not costing them a single farthing. The others only paid a nominal sum ranging from \$1.50 to \$3.00 a week, only a few paying the larger amount. The average of each patient was less than 50 cents a day. The actual cost of maintenance to the institution is over \$9.00 a week so that our readers can readily see how strong a case is made out by the Trustees in their appeal to make provision for just such a patient as that from Fort William—only one of scores who are constantly seeking admission.

Distribution of Seed Grain & Potatoes.

By instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture a distribution is being made this season of samples of superior sorts of grain and potatoes to Canadian farmers for the improvement of seed. The stock for distribution has been secured mainly from the Experimental farms at Indian Head, Sask. and Brandon, Man. The samples consist of Oats, spring wheat, barley, Indian corn, (for ensilage only) and potatoes. The quantity of oats sent is 4 lbs., and of wheat or barley 5 lbs., sufficient in each case to sow one-twentieth of an acre. The samples of Indian corn and potatoes weigh 3 lbs. each. A quantity of each of the following varieties has been secured for distribution:—

OATS.—Banner, Wide-Awake, White Giant, Danish Island, Thousand Dollar Improved Ligowo, all white varieties. Black oats are not recommended for general cultivation, a few samples, however, are available which can be sent if specially asked for.

WHEAT.—Tee Fife (beardless); Preston, Pringle's Champion and Huron (early bearded sorts) Percy and Stanley (early bearded varieties).

BARLEY.—Six rowed.—Messury; Ossa, Mansfield and Claude. Two rowed.—Standwell, Invincible, Canadian Thorpe and Sidney.

INDIAN CORN (for ensilage)—Early sunrise, Angel of Midnight, Compton's Early and Longfellow; later varieties, Selected Learning, Early Mastodon and White Cap Yellow Dent.

POTATOES.—Early varieties, Earl, White Prize and Rochester Rose. Medium to late varieties, Carman No. 1 and Late Puritan. These later varieties are as a rule more productive than the earlier kinds.

Only one sample can be sent to each applicant, hence if an individual receives a sample of oats he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley, Indian corn or potatoes. Lists of names from one individual, or application for more than one sample from one household cannot be entertained. The samples will be sent free of charge through the mail.

Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa, and may be sent in any time before the 15th of February, after which

the lists will be closed, so that the samples asked for may be sent out in good time for sowing. Applicants should mention the variety they prefer with a second suit as an alternative. Applications will be filled in the order in which they are received, so long as the supply of seed lasts. Farmers are advised to apply early to avoid possible disappointment. These applying for Indian corn or potatoes should bear in mind that the corn is not usually distributed until April, and that potatoes cannot be mailed from here until danger from frost is over. No postage is required on mail matter addressed to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.
