

Domestic and Foreign Markets

Tuesday Evening, Jan. 19. Liverpool wheat futures closed 10-day 1/4 higher, and corn closed 1/4 higher than yesterday.

At Chicago, May wheat closed 1/4 higher than yesterday, May corn closed 1/4 higher, and May oats closed 1/4 higher.

New York Dairy Market. NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Butter—Barely steady, unchanged; receipts, 1,115.

CATTLE MARKETS. Cables Lower—American Markets Steady and Generally Firm.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—London cables for cattle are steady, at 12c to 12 1/2c per lb. dressed weight, refrigerator beef is quoted at 10 1/2c to 10 3/4c per lb.

Toronto Live Stock. TORONTO, Jan. 19.—Receipts of live stock at the City Market, as reported by the railways, were 120 carloads, consisting of 2087 cattle, 1350 hogs, 1299 sheep and lambs and 88 calves.

Exporters. Not many export cattle were offered—more than six loads all told. Choice shipping steers were scarce, and prices for them were firm, ranging from \$5 to \$5.50 the latter price being obtained by Dunn & Leveck for the best load on the market, weighing 1350 lbs. Bulls sold at from \$2.75 to \$3.75.

Butchers. Prime picked lots of butchers were very scarce—so scarce that Alexander Leveck, who always buys the best, had to buy some of export weights to get the quality he required.

Feeders and Stockers. H. & W. Murby report a limited number on sale, with a demand for all on sale, as several farmers were on the market to purchase both feeders and stockers.

Milkers and Springers. The number of milkers and springers on sale was fairly large, well up to the dried mark. Trade was moderately good, considering that the Montreal buyers were not on the market.

Veal Calves. About 100 calves were on sale. Prices for them were firm at \$3 to \$7 per cwt., with an odd milk-fed calf now and again going at \$7.50.

Sheep and Lambs. Receipts were moderate—about 1200—but prices were easier, especially for lambs. Ewes, \$4 to \$4.50; rams, \$3.50 to \$4; lambs, \$5.50 to \$6.50 per cwt.

Hogs. Mr. Harris reported the market steady, as follows: Selects, \$6.50, fed and watered, and \$6.25 to drovers f.o.b. cars at country points.

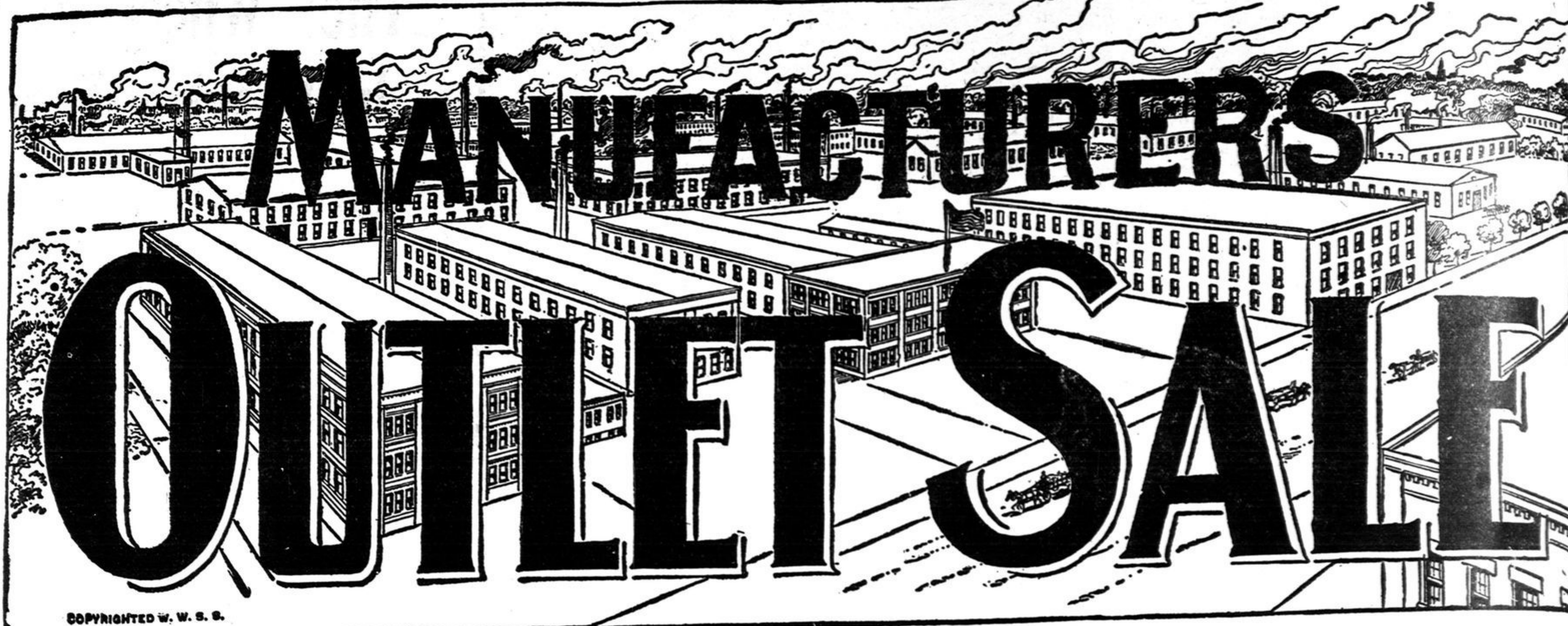

Chicago Live Stock. CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—Cattle—Receipts estimated at 4500; market steady; steers, \$4.40 to \$4.50; cows, \$3 to \$3.50; heifers, \$3 to \$3.75; bulls, \$2.40 to \$3.80; calves, \$3.50 to \$4.50; stockers and feeders, \$2.50 to \$3.50.
