WAS SCALDED IN A VAT OF BOILING WATER ON MONDAY.

Suffering from injuries received on Monday last, little Rea Waldon, the four year old son of Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Waldon, of Ops, passed away at the Ross Memorial Hospital Tuesday. It will be remembered that on Monday the little fellow fell into a large vat of boiling water and was scalded, and his whole body was badly blistered from the effects. While being taken to the hospital in a buggy by his father and mother the horse ran away and the vehicle was badly smashed. Considerable delay was caused, but finally the young lad was brought to the hospital in another buggy. There his injuries were attended to, but his condition gradually grew worse, until death finally ended his sufferings in the hospital last evening.

The sympathy of the entire community is extended to Mr. and Mrs. Waldon in their bereavement. The funeral took place Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the family residence, lot 6, con 16, Ops, to Riverside cemetery.

### Sad Case of Vagrancy In the Police Court

OLD MAN SUFFERING FROM ST. VITUS' DANCE MAY BE SENT TO HOUSE OF REFUGE.

A sad case of vagrancy was brought before His Worship, Magistrate Moore, this morning. William Sang, of the township of Fenelon, was charged with vagrancy and having no visible means of support. The case was particularly hard for Magistrate Moore to deal with, owing to Sang not residing in the county for two years' time. He was remanded to the county jail till next Monday at 10 a.m., when he will be again remanded till the county Council meets and takes steps towards having him sent to the House of Refuge.

Sang is suffering from a terrible malady called Chorea or St. Vitus' dance. He is unable to keep still a minute and talks with a stammer and can talk sensible. He has been in the county gaol since last November. Since then his disease has become chronic and very little can be done for him now.

### Agricultural Classes Will be Advertised

At the meeting of the Board of Education Wednesday, Mr. Reed, who has charge of the Agricultural classes for this district, was present and placed two requests before the trustees.

He first asked for a fence placed around the plot at the Collegiate Institute, which he estimates would cost between fifty and sixty dollars. It was decided to let the matter stand and bring it before the County Council when they applied for their annual grant.

Mr. Reed also asked for the sum of \$25.00 for the purpose of advertising the agricultural classes. He thought it would be wise to send a circular to the parents of those in the county who passed the entrance examination. He also intended to have published the prize lists. He thought that it was necessary to advertise the work being done, and was sure that they would receive returns for the money thus expended.

The proposition met with the unanimous approval of those present, and it was decided to grant Mr. Reed the required sum for this purpose.
