Liverpool Wheat Futures Close Lower, Chicago Higher—Live Stock—The Latest Quotations.

Tuesday Evening, June 2. Liverpool wheat futures closed to-day 1/4c to 1/2c lower than yesterday, and corn futures unchanged.

At Chicago July wheat closed 1/4c higher than yesterday, July corn 1/4c higher, and July oats unchanged.

CATTLE MARKETS. Cables Unchanged—American Markets Are Generally Steady.

LONDON, June 2.—London cables for cattle are steady at 12c to 14c per pound dressed weight.

TORONTO, June 2.—Receipts of live stock at the City Market, as reported by the railways, were 129 carloads, composed of 2260 cattle, 1570 hogs, 406 sheep, 582 calves and 15 horses.

Exporters. Export steers of prime quality sold from 49 to 56.45, medium, 53.75 to 58; export bulls, 45.00 to 53.25.

Butchers. Prime picked lots, 50 to 55.90; loads of good, 53.50 to 55.00; medium, 45 to 52.50; common, 40.00 to 45.00; cows, 33.50 to 41.75; canners, 33 to 38 per cwt.

Milk and Springers. There was a good demand for good to choice milkers that sold from 30 to 40, and one extra milker brought \$28.

Feeders and Stockers. Messrs. H. & W. Murby report prices for feeders and stockers about steady at following quotations: Good steers, 1000 to 1100 lbs. each, at 47.75 to 55 per cwt.
