## Demonstration in Drainage Should Interest Farmers

Prof. W. H. Day, of Ontario Agricultural College, and Mr. F. H. Reed, of School of Agriculture, Lindsay, Will Plot Drains Near Oakwood.

On Monday, June 15th, at 5 o'clock, on the farm of Mr. George J. Coad, at Oakwood, Professor N. H. Day, of the Ontario Agricultural College, and Mr. F. H. Reed, of the Department of Agriculture, of Lindsay, will give a practical demonstration and explanation of a surveyor's methods of mapping out a system of drains. On Mr. Coad's farm, about half a mile west of Oakwood, there are between fifty and sixty acres of low lying, very flat land. An attempt has been made to drain this land by open ditches, but as the fall is very light, this method of drainage has not been successful, and clearly it is a place for tile drains. The fact that there is very little, if any, natural fall, the presence on the land of several deep pot-holes, also the presence of the open ditches, renders this a somewhat complicated problem in tile drainage and hence a very suitable location for a public demonstration of improved methods.

The plan of demonstration will be as follows: Professor Day will at two o'clock give a short talk on drainage methods. Then he and Mr. Reed will, using Mr. Coad's land, demonstrate, and a large chart for illustration, proceed to make the survey. By means of a home-made drainage level and a surveyor's level, they will outline the points one hundred feet apart over the whole area to be drained. From these figures they will make a map showing the location of all the drains, mains and laterals, also their grades and depths. Having this map, Mr. Coad may accurately stake out and dig his drains. Figures on the map indicate the depth of the drain at all points, and by stretching a cord above the drain and making the bottom of the ditch an even distance from the cord, a sufficient and regular fall will be secured throughout the length of each drain. This spring, on many drained lands, the farmers were almost through seeding before their neighbors on adjoining undrained farms were able to get on their land. This wet season has forcefully demonstrated the advantages of under-draining, but even in a dry season the returns from well drained land are greatly superior to the returns from undrained land. The purpose of this demonstration is to give practical instruction in drainage methods. Professor Day has had wide experience in this work, and will give much useful information on the details of the work; it is careful attention to details which makes drainage pay. All who may be interested are invited to be present at Mr. George Coad's farm on Monday, June 15th, at 2 o'clock. Come and bring your neighbors.

## VICTORIA CO. COUNCIL HOLDING JUNE SESSION

### Some Important Matters Awaiting Attention

### GOOD ROAD SYSTEM

May be Submitted to the Vote of The People Next January

The County Council met Tuesday afternoon at 2 p.m., with Warden R. M. Mason in the chair and the following members present: Messrs. F. C. Fielding, Bexley; George Byng, Bobcaygeon; Jas. ### THE WARDEN'S ADDRESS.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria: Gentlemen.—While the volume and importance of matters which will require your attention at the present session is large, there are but few questions calling for my initiative in bringing them before you.

Since the January session the Council of the township of Somerville passed a resolution under the pro-

vision to be contributed by the local municipality. All the documents in the Mitchell's bridge case will be submitted.

I desire to ask your attention to the provisions of the Assessment Act relating to sales of lands for taxes, with a view to a limit being fixed as to the amount of arrears of taxes for which a parcel of land may be advertised.

Your attention is requested to the cases of two men who spent the winter in the gaol as vagrants, and one of whom is again in the gaol, and has been remanded until you can have an opportunity to consider what (if anything) should be done by the County respecting permanent maintenances. Neither of these men seems to come within the rules and regulations governing admission to the House of Refuge.

At the January session some consideration was given to the right of Justices of Peace, other than the County Police Magistrate, to try offences which arise under certain statutes, and the disposition of the fines. It is desirable that the question be further considered. All documents relating to matters which require your consideration and decision will be laid before you.

A special meeting of the council was held Saturday evening at the County Office, Fenelon Falls, for the purpose of considering the advisability of entering into an agreement with the Board of Commissioners for the County of Victoria, to serve the township of Fenelon Falls, in connection with the establishment of a water supply for the township. A number of the Water Commissioners waited on the Council at Fenelon Falls, and pointed out the importance of the matter to the township. It was decided to refer the matter to the County Council, and to request the County Council to take the necessary steps to have the matter considered at their next meeting.

THE SPEED OF TRAINS.

The next matter brought before the Council was a letter from Mr. Shyne, informing the Council that he had been struck by a train on the Victoria and North Yorkville Railway, and that he was unable to get up from the hospital. The matter was referred to the County Council, and it was decided to have the County Council send a letter to the Railway Company, expressing their sympathy for Mr. Shyne, and requesting that they should take the necessary steps to have him discharged from the hospital as soon as possible.

ANOTHER RAILWAY.

A letter from the Board of Commissioners was also received, and the question to be considered was the advisability of having a railway line from Fenelon Falls to Lindsay. The question was referred to the County Council, and it was decided to have the County Council send a letter to the Board of Commissioners, expressing their interest in the matter, and requesting that they should take the necessary steps to have the matter considered at their next meeting.
