CONSECRATION OF HIS EMINENCE ARCHBISHOP McEVAY AT ST. MICHAEL'S CATHEDRAL WAS GREAT SPECTACLE

Papal Ab'legate Conducted Ceremony With the Impressive Ritual of Roman Catholic Church—Clergy Take Oath of Fealty—Great Gathering of Church Dignitaries—Apostolic Delegates Celebrate Mass.

(Special to Free Press.) Toronto, June 18.—The installation of the Most Rev. Fergus Patrick McEvay, D.D., formerly Bishop of London, as the Archbishop of Toronto in succession to his Grace Archbishop O'Connor, was the occasion of a brilliant and impressive ceremony in St. Michael's Cathedral yesterday morning.

St. Michael's Cathedral was filled with people. Where the clergy were counted in scores, the laity were numbered by hundreds. Headed by acolytes, carrying book, candle and censor, and followed by the priests of the diocese, and the visiting and diocesan priests, the archbishop's procession passed from the palace along Shuter and Bond streets to the main entrance of the cathedral.

At the entrance to the cathedral his grace was received by Vicar-General McCann, and after sprinkling holy water upon the people and blessing the incense, proceeded up the aisle to the sanctuary, where he knelt in prayer. He then proceeded to the altar, and read the prayer to St. Michael.

Addresses were presented by both clergy and laity to which the archbishop replied and the clergy of the Toronto diocese took the oath of fealty to their new diocesan. First in the procession came Father McGrand, the cross-bearer, holding aloft the richly ornamented gold cross. After him came the acolytes, followed by the Christian Brothers and the priests, about two hundred in number.

It was with peal of bells and grand acclaim of organ notes, that notice of the approach of the procession of ecclesiastics and church dignitaries who heralded the entry of Archbishop McEvay was given. Outside, the square which surrounds the church was lined on every side by interested spectators, while within every available spot except the centre aisle, down which the procession would pass, was occupied.

As the surpliced train entered the immense concourse of people rose and to the strains of musical note from the organ and from sweet-throated boys, the procession slowly made its way down the aisle. First came Rev. J. McGrand in surplice and dalmatic of cloth of gold, bearing aloft the golden processional Cross. Supporting him were six acolytes and following these was a large contingent of the black-robed Brothers of the schools.

socked bishops and their attendants to pass. As the bishops entered the sanctuary, Archbishop McEvay knelt for a few moments, after which the initiatory psalms were chanted.

When the Archbishop had taken his place upon the throne prepared, the Very Rev. Vicar-General McCann ascended the pulpit and read the Papal Bulls appointing Archbishop McEvay to the See of Toronto. They were dated at Rome the 23rd of April. At the close the priests of the Archdiocese gathered around the throne to kiss the ring of the new Shepherd and to give public testimony of their allegiance.

At the entrance to the cathedral his grace was received by Vicar-General McCann, and after sprinkling holy water upon the people and blessing the incense, proceeded up the aisle to the sanctuary, where he knelt in prayer. He then proceeded to the altar, and read the prayer to St. Michael. After his grace had returned to the pre dieu, the vicar-general ascended the pulpit and read the papal brief transferring him from London to Toronto.

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At the conclusion of the Delegate's reply the Te Deum was splendidly sung by the choir, after which the priests filed out and the immense congregation dispersed, all feeling that an epoch-making event had taken place in the history of the church in Toronto.

The Archbishop was assisted at the throne by Very Rev. Dean Morris and Rev. H. Gibney.

The music furnished by the choir under Mr. J. Dickson was the finest heard in the Cathedral since the change in church music. A Salve Regina was sung at the Offertory by Mr. Leutner in magnificent voice and with fine interpretation.

At the close of the mass the Very Rev. Vicar-General read an address of welcome to the Papal Delegate, to which the latter made a reply, eulogizing the church and concluding with the words: I desire to express another lively and ardent wish that I cherish, namely, that the faithful laity, the clergy, and the bishop will be always united, that the bonds be-
