Sturgeon Point Council Held Meeting Tuesday Night

THE RATE OF ASSESSMENT WAS FIXED AT FOURTEEN MILLS - QUESTION OF FIRE PROTECTION DISCUSSED - YOUNG PEOPLE WANT DANCING PAVILION - OTHER MATTERS.

The inaugural meeting of the new Sturgeon Point Council was held last Tuesday at the wharf shelter, Reeve J. W. Anderson and Councillors Wallace Jones, Jos. Brown, J. M. Knowlson, Robt. Miller and Clerk and Treasurer G. H. Hopkins being present.

In the assessment made by the Council would mean a jump at about \$5 or better in the taxes of many of the cottagers.

Moved by Coun. Brown, seconded by Coun. Miller, that the estimates be approved. Carried. A by-law was then passed, fixing the rate at 14 mills.

On motion Mr. Robt. Graham was re-engaged as sanitary inspector at the old salary.

Cou. Brown urged that the graveling on Fourth-st. be completed, and Ald. Miller was named to have the Lane-ave. wells cleaned out and the pumps refilled with new valves.

Cou. Jones, returning to the water level question, said he had written Hon. Mr. Graham early in the season in the capacity of secretary of the Point Fish and Game Association, urging him to see that the water was kept up in order to protect the spawn.

Cou. Miller—"I would like to spend \$100 in cleaning up the spring park and providing a few seats. If we don't we won't have a boat next year. We must encourage the townspeople to come here—at present they think they're not wanted."

On motion Mr. F. H. Hopkins was heard. He pointed out that the question of better fire protection was now before the Council, and a suitable place would be needed for storing the equipment.

Reeve Anderson—"What we want is to encourage small parties of town and country people to come here for a day's outing. One hundred people coming here in a week would mean a revenue of \$25 for the boats."

Cou. Jones—"It might be better to accommodate them at the spring, rather than have them take possession of our laws and seats."

Cou. Brown—"The impression is widespread that visitors are not wanted at the Point. The wood at the spring should be cleaned up and benches provided."

Reeve Anderson—"I don't want to encourage the landing of excursion parties, but I do think we should welcome small parties of citizens whenever they come."

THE ASSESSMENT. Clerk Hopkins said the village assessment this year was \$64,885, as compared with about \$33,000 last year. There would be required for ordinary purposes the sum of \$604.63, less receipts of about \$100.

Cou. Miller—"Perhaps we should cut out the expenditure on the park this season."

Former Lindsay Priest Dies at Belleville

DEATH OF MGR. FARRELLY - WAS IN CHARGE OF ST. MARY'S, LINDSAY.

Belleville, July 8.—The dath took place here this morning of the Right Rev. Monsignor Farrelly, one of the oldest priests in Canada, after some months' illness. Deceased was born in Cavan county, Ireland, in 1827, ordained priest in 1851 and created Monsignor, with the title of Domestic Prelate, by Pope Leo XIII. in 1880.

He celebrated his golden jubilee in the priesthood here in 1901. He was administrator of the Diocese and Archdiocese of Kingston during the absence of their Bishops. He had the esteem of all classes in this district, and his death is a great shock to his parishioners.

Many of the old parishioners of St. Mary's will recall Mgr. Farrelly's death with deep regret.
