LINDSAY ORANGEMEN MADE A
SPLENDID SHOWING IN PETERBORO

THE GREATEST DAY PETERBORO HAS EVER SEEN — SYLVESTER BAND DRIVEN—MASTER G. A. JORDAN HEADS THE LOCAL CONTINGENT.

(Special to The Free Press.) Peterboro, July 13th.—The 21st anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne will go down in the history of the city. The first train that arrived from the east brought over one hundred people bound for Peterboro, and every train since has brought large numbers of people into the city. The streets are crowded and the street railway and liveries are doing a land office business. Never before was there so much excitement as there is here to-day. The Lindsay lodges were among the first arrivals and marched to Central Park, headed by the Sylvester Band. They were warmly received, and the music of the band was greatly admired. At Central Park the lodges were dismissed to form up again at 1.30 o'clock. The mob that crowded into that small area was greater than anything ever seen before, and it was two o'clock before the local and visiting brethren of the Orange Order started down George-st.

The procession was headed by the standard-bearers with the Union Jack, and followed by Mr. W. H. E. Armstrong, County Master and Grand Marshal. He was seated on a spirited white horse and was arrayed in the gay costume of King William. The lodges lined up in the following order: County of East Durham, County of West Durham, County of Hastings, County of Victoria, County of Northumberland, East Peterborough. The procession moved down George-st. and after marching through several of the main streets returned to Central Park, where addresses were delivered by the prominent men of the Order. The bands played all the Orange airs in the route along the line of march, and the Protestant Boys repeated many times. Several fine and drum bands were in line; one of them consisted of two fifes, a bass and kettle drum, but nevertheless they made as much noise as some of the large bands. The Lindsay lodges, in command of Master E. A. Jordan, made an excellent showing in the parade, and were favorably commented on along the line of march. The Sylvester Band, and the 57th Band of Peterboro, were very conspicuous among the musical aggregations present.

LIQUOR CASE DISMISSED
IN COURT LAST FRIDAY

MR. LAWLESS, OF BOBCAYGEON, CHARGED WITH BREACH OF LIQUOR LICENSE ACT.

The charge of illegal sale of liquor against Mr. Lawless, of Bobcaygeon, came up again Friday morning before Magistrate Moore for the third time, and from the appearances of the case it will appear again. Mr. Weldon, who prosecuted, spoke first. He endeavored to explain to the magistrate the reason the witnesses were all looking for them, but they have not been discovered yet. Mr. T. Stewart, who defended Mr. Lawless, asked to have the case dismissed. Mr. Weldon remarked that the absence of the witnesses was an indication that there must be something in the case. Mr. Lithgow, the license inspector for East Victoria, was then called upon to give evidence. He gave an account of the complaint, and said he received it from a man on the boat, who said that liquor had been obtained after hours. He (the man on the boat), also said that G. Ellsworth had obtained one bottle after hours and paid for it on Saturday, when he left an order for another bottle to be obtained that evening. Mr. Lawless told the inspector that at closing hour Ellsworth had not appeared for it, so when he (Mr. Lawless) was closing the bar, he brought the bottle out with him and Ellsworth came in afterwards and got it.
