A few choice bulls weighing from 1500 to 1800 lbs each, were bought at 4%c to 5%c per lb. The extreme heat tended to check the demand from local and outside buyers for butchers' stock and trade was somewhat slow, even at the reduction in prices, as the quality of the stock offered was not up to the mark. There were no choice beeves on the market and the top figures realized for the best were 54c to 5%c and the lower grades sold from there down to 21/c to 3c per lb. A weaker feeling has developed in the market for sheep and prices are 1/2c to %c per lb. lower than a week ago on account of the very discouraging advices of late from European sources, where prices have scored a sharp decline to 9c to 10c per Tb., as against 13c to 14c some two or three weeks ago, consequently the demand here for sheep has fallen off considerably for export account and the outside price now for choice stock is 34c and the culls are selling at 3c to 34c per

The local demand for spring lambs is good of which supplies are none too pler-tiful and prices are maintained at from \$3.50 to \$5 each. Receipts of calves have fallen off very much of late and the undertone to the market in consequence is stronger and for the quality of the stock coming forward \$5 to \$7 each is being paid,
