#### WM. SHOULDISCE, VALENTIA.

The late Wm. Shouldisce, who died at Valentia on July 6th, 1908, was born in Limerick Co., Ireland, in 1825, and emigrated to Canada in 1828, with his parents, Jacob and Eliza Shouldisce. It took six weeks to cross the Atlantic to Quebec. They went to Toronto, then called Little York, where they resided for about 15 years, thinking that Little York would never be a prosperous place, they decided to come further east to Mariposa township, and located at Valentia. There his parents settled with their family in the bush, and started and cleaned some 50 acres of land.

The late Wm. Shouldisce went a little further south when 22 years old, and took a farm on the shores of Lake Lake Seugog, which had just been dammed. The dam was constructed by the John Sandfield Macdonald Government. There was just one small store in Lindsay, the rest all swamp. The nearest grist mill was at Port Hope. The subject of this sketch married at the age of 22 the daughter of John Irwin, who had immigrated with his wife and family from the County of Wexford, Ireland. John and Ann Irwin (whose maiden name was Ann Whitney) settled near Omemece, in the township of Emily, till death parted them. The late Wm. Shouldisce has resided on his farm ever since and raised a family of twelve children, eight

boys and four girls, of whom ten are alive and two dead. David and Abraham are farmers at Elmore, Sask.; Henry at Pierson, Manitoba, Mrs. Sheriff at Pierson, Manitoba, Mrs. Sullivan at Ashgrove, Sask., Thomas at home on the farm, Charlotte at home, Isaac in Lindsay, Mrs. George Simpson in Lindsay, north ward, and William, who gained distinction in the great South African war, is in Toronto in the American Abell Machine Co.

The late William Shouldisce was in politics a Conservative, in religion a Methodist. One sister survives him—Mrs. G. Dricic, of Duluth, Minn. The pall-bearers were Richard Suggett, Joseph Mark, James Pollock, Wm. Swain, James Stokes and Burk Swain. The Rev. Mr. Moore, of Little Britain, preached the funeral sermon.
