Factories Refused to Sell Last Week Offered 3-8 of a Cent Less Monday

BID 12 3-16c. LAST WEEK, BUT THOUGHT PRICE TOO LOW — HELD TO-DAY AND HAD TO TAKE LESS—CHEESE SCARCE.

A meeting of the Cheese Board was held Monday morning in the Council chamber, buyers Flavalle, Gillespie and Brown being present. The president, Mr. Robson, occupied the chair. It will be remembered that the factories refused to sell last week at 12 3-16c., and were willing to do a little speculating and hold their cheese another week, so the following prices will show how much they made of their speculation.

Mr. Gillespie renewed his old bid of 11 1/2c. Mr. Flavalle then bid 11 1/2c. and called North Ops, which was the only factory that would sell at that price.
