GRAIN AND PRODUCE QUOTA TIONS FOR OUR READERS.

There was produce in abundance at Saturday's market; butter was plentiful at 27c., although some stuck to last week's price and asked 26c. There was no advance in eggs from last week and they appeared quite plentiful.

Poultry is becoming more plenti-

Poultry is becoming momre plentiful and the price is weakening, in sympathy with the supply. Although a high price is being asked, some excellent chickens were offered for 70c. per pair, and did not last long at that price. It being a little early for ducks and geese, none were offer-

Potatoes are offered in larger quanfive to fifteen cents per bag since tities, and the price has dropped from last week. Some good potatoes were on sale on Saturday at 80c. per bag, and it is expected that they will be bought at a much lower price inside of a few weeks. The prices for grain Saturday evening for Montreal to remains practically the same as they were in last week's quotations, with \$4.70; medium, \$3.90 to \$4.15; common, \$3.50 very little offering. Barley and fall wheat make up the bulk of the grain that is being delivered at present. There appears to be a good demand for oats in town, but it is not enough to put the price over 35 cents.

> Hogs and cattle are scarce, but the prospects for hogs being more plentiful in a few weeks is probably helping to keep the present low price where it is.

> There is very little hay coming into town, only a few loads being offered Saturday. Prices asked for them was \$10. It is not likely that hay will reach the high price it did last year, but even at the present price farmers

MONTREAL, Sept. 7 .- (Special.)-at the Montreal Stock Yards' West End Market the receipts of live stock for the week ending Sept. 5, were 4330 cattle, 4342 sheep and lambs, 2283 hogs and 500 calves, while the supply for local consumption this morning was 2000 cattle, 900 sheep and lumbs, 700 hogs and 150 calves. The supply of cattle was larger than it has been for some weeks past and as it consisted chiefly of common and inferior stock the market for such was weak and prices since this day week show a decline of fully 4c per lb., but as really good and choice beeves continue scarce values for these were maintained. Considering the large offerings which were somewhat excess of the requirements of the trade a fairly active business was done, owing to the fact that the demand from Quebec buyers was good and at the reduction in prices for the lower grades local operators showed a disposition to buy more freely on account of the cooler weather and now that householders are returning from the country fast the consymption of beef is steadily increasing. There was no demand from local exporters, they having ample stock coming forward from the west to fill all their space. Cables

from Liverpool on Saturday reported trade slow, but noted no change in prices as compared with a week ago, A few choice beeves sold here at 5c; good, at 41/2c to 41/4c: fair, at 31/4c to 31/4c; common, at 21/4c to 3c, and inferior, at 2c to 21/4c per lb. Owing to the steady increase in the receipts of lambs of late, a weaker feeling has developed in the market and prices have declined 1/2 to 1/2 per lb. At this reduction the demand for local consumption was good and a fairly active trade was done at 51/c to 51/c per 1b There was no change in sheep, but the demand for export account was somewhat slow this morning, at 4c, with the culls at 31/2c to 31/4c per lb.
