### Jockey Club Buys Farm of 150 Acres

The Ontario Jockey Club has purchased property on the Kingston road aggregating 142 acres-102 acres on one side of the road and 40 acres on the other. The property has been used for the point to point races of the Hunt Club for some time past, and is known as the Lawrence Farm. "The price paid," said an officer of the club to-day, " was a large one for farm land, but it is a good investment."

Asked whether the O.J.C. had any intention of selling the Woodbine, Mr. Fraser said that they had not, but in ase of necessity they would be in a position to prevent any hold-up in getting a new home. The city had made an offer in the sewage disposal matter, but the O.J.C. would not consider the proposition.

It is the intention to erect on the 40-acre piece a schooling field for jumpers, with three jumps 3 ft. 8 in. to train horses over, and besides make a full steeplechase course, including a Liverpool, there-brush and banks alternating. And accommodation can be secured out there for schooling horses. Meanwhile, the O.J.C. will continue to race at Woodbine.


