RESULT OF THE CAMPAIGN.

The elections are over, and as usual the outcome presented many surprises. Liberals in this riding were confident of the return of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to power, but were inclined to agree with those who predicted that some charges of graft hurled at his administration by the Tory journals and speakers would stick, and that the Liberal majority in the house would be cut down to between 20 and 30.

In this riding the greatly enhanced vote taken by Col. Hughes, the Conservative candidate, comes as a great surprise to many who had been led to believe that Dr. Wilson, of Fenelon Falls, the Liberal nominee, was showing unlooked-for strength in his canvass—particularly in Hailburton county. Wise ones there were who shook their heads and whispered that the best to be hoped for was a substantial cutting down of the Colonel's former majority of 303. That even this half-success was not achieved does not reflect blame on Dr. Wilson who with splendid determination, covered the major part of the huge constituency in the brief time at his disposal, and made a good impression everywhere he appeared.

Well may the Colonel view the result as a personal triumph. From time to time he was "damned with faint praise" by the so-called Tory organ in Lindsay, but the help it extended during the contest—as before its inception—was of the most niggardly and ineffective type—in fact we believe we are correct in saying that only once since the campaign opened was Col. Hughes' name mentioned in the editorial columns of the Watchman-Warrior, and then only in a clipping from a real Tory paper—the Mail and Empire, and that despite the well-known fact that Col. Hughes was the unanimous choice of the united Conservative party in this riding.

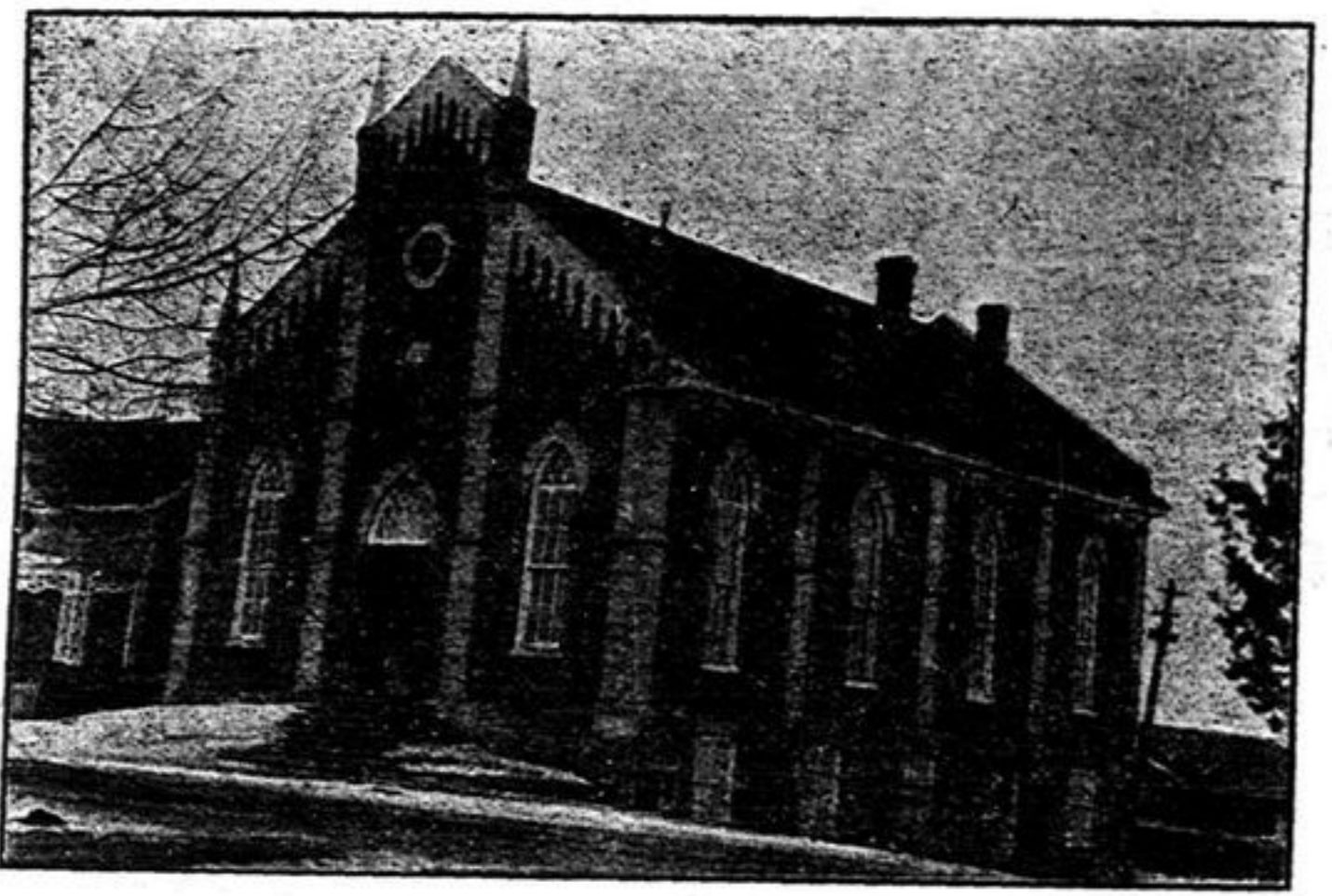

CORRUPTION ARRESTS

Winnipeg and Brockville Have Liberals Jailed.

Conservatives Swear Out Three Warrants on Charges of Bribery in Winnipeg and Prisoners Are Remanded—Picton and Smith's Falls Men Arrested on Appearance at Polls in Brockville.

Brockville Oct. 27.—Victor Tedford, who claims to be Montreal sleuth on the staff of the Thiel Agency, was taken into custody yesterday morning on a charge of vagrancy for the purpose of holding him on accusations of electoral corruption, preferred by the local Conservatives. He is out on bail furnished by Liberal workers. In the Police Court he changed his name to Quinn, and said he was sent here to keep an eye on election matters without regard to party. Conservatives have been showing him for over a week, and claim to have incriminating evidence connecting him with the Liberal machine.

P. Brady, now of Smith's Falls, and Don McLennan of Picton were challenged and sworn. Immediately afterwards they were locked up on a charge of perjury, only to be quickly bailed out by party friends. John A. Derbyshire was served with a summons for his appearance at the Police Court on the 31st inst. on a charge of bribery. He is a son of Senator Dan Derbyshire. He was the victim of a trap laid in a polling sub-division of the west ward. The Conservatives allege that money was used wholesale, reaching the purchasable element by letter through the postoffice.

Winnipeg, Oct. 27.—The provincial authorities yesterday morning arrested R. R. McLennan, a prominent Liberal, and former well-known hockey player, at breakfast in his home on bribery charges. Later he appeared before Judge Meyers, together with W. A. Carson and George McLean, who had been in the provincial jail over Sunday, and the three were released on bail. W. A. Carson, ex-president of the Manitoba branch of the Caledonian Club, and a prominent Liberal, was arrested Sunday night by officials of the provincial police and taken to the provincial jail. No charge has been preferred against Carson as far as can be learned.

E. J. Roehen, proprietor of the Clarendon Hotel, immediately hurried down to the jail and offered bail, but access to the prisoner was refused Roehen, the prisoner's friends and even his counsel.

LOSES BOTH LEGS.

C.P.R. Brakeman Shows Remarkable Pluck. Toronto, Oct. 27.—John MacDermott, of 180 Dundas street, West Toronto, a brakeman on the C. P. R., was taken to the Western Hospital from the Union Station yesterday morning with both legs crushed so severely that his recovery is doubtful. MacDermott left the city Sunday night on a freight train running east. At Myrtle he proceeded to uncouple some cars from the train, when he slipped and fell, both feet slipping between the wheels. The whole train of 28 cars passed over his legs, practically severing them between the knees and ankles.

Although both legs were practically severed from his body, the wounded man kept his presence of mind, and, fearing that another train would come along he managed to drag himself across the lines of track, and up an embankment fifty feet away. His subsequent actions displayed extraordinary presence of mind. His legs were not quite severed, and to stem the blood MacDermott reached down, and pulling off one of his boots, removed a piece from it, and bound up one of the stumps as tightly as he could. While he was working on the other, a searching party heard his groans, and found him. He was picked up and carried to the station. In the morning he was brought in on the 7.30 train and taken to the hospital in an ambulance.

A Wild West Tragedy.

New Orleans, Oct. 27.—At Gulfport, Miss., a cowboy belonging to a wild-west show, rode into a crowd of negroes, beating them over the heads with a revolver. Policeman Varnadoe started in pursuit of Seely and the two men were lost to view in a cloud of dust. Later their bodies were found, each bearing a single bullet wound and each man's revolver containing one empty chamber.

Seized Indecent Postcards.

Montreal, Oct. 27.—The police have seized some 3,000 postcards alleged to be indecent and the same are being printed the same in the printing establishment of David Al. lan, Notre Dame street. The proprietor was placed under arrest, but as he was a returning office in yesterday's election, he was released on bail.

Bryan Was Kissed Twice.

New York, Oct. 27.—When W. J. Bryan entered the Astor gallery at a reception of the Woman's Democratic Club at the Waldorf-Astoria yesterday, he was kissed by two women, in the presence of nearly seven hundred others, and narrowly escaped the embraces of a third. Mrs. Bryan was present. Mr. Bryan displayed some embarrassment.

Woman Shorter and Broader.

London, Oct. 27.—(C.A.P.)—Robert McKay, Hamilton, Ont., has lost the case brought against him by S. J. Lyons, wholesale customer, claiming payment for a number of costumes supplied. Prince Henri of Prussia Will Steer the New Dirigible Airship

KAISER WILHELM'S SON SITS AT STEERING WHEEL OF COUNT'S REMODELLED DIRIGIBLE BALOON AND MAKES IT EXECUTE INTRICATE MANOEUVRES.

(Special to the Free Press.) Friedrichshafen, Oct. 28.—Prince Henri of Prussia spent several hours in the air yesterday as the guest of Count Zeppelin, who made an ascension in his remodeled airship at a comparatively early hour. Not only did the prince thoroughly enjoy his experience, but he sat at the steering wheel for many miles of the flight, guiding the movements of the craft and compelling it to execute all kinds of complicated manoeuvres. Prince Henri's satisfaction at the great flight was unbounded, and he gave expression to it in a telegram which he sent to the Emperor: "Under Zeppelin's guidance I felt just as safe as in my own flagship." Capt. Mischke also was a passenger when the start was made, in the direction of Ueberlingen, to the northward of Constance. With Count Zeppelin himself at the wheel, the airship rose to an altitude of 600 feet, and moving rapidly against a strong wind, soon disappeared behind a
