I am thankful to be able to say that during the year that is past our town has been comparatively free from contagious diseases. During the year several samples of well water have been analysed and pronounced unsafe for domestic use ,and it is the opinion of the Board that water is being used from wells which are polluted. This is a matter which the Board has not been able to deal with, owing to the water in the water mains also being impure. If the new filtration plant proves successful in providing a wholesome supply of water ,there is will be condemned, and orders be issued for closing the same.

A committee appointed to inspect places in September. The report brought in by the committee bore convincing proof of unsanitary conditions surrounding the places where our meats are prepared. No attempt is made by the butchers to comply with the Medical Health Act governing slaughter houses. The Board of Health have discussed the wisdom of animals should be inspected by a capable inspector before being allowed to be slaughtered, such abattoir to be built in accordance with the Medical Health Act, and to be maintained under the supervision of an inspector serve sanitary methods. medical congress condemned impure All of which is respectfully submit- milk as the transmitter of many diseases, such as typhoid fever, consumption ,etc. Milk is a diet, especially adapted to children, and at a time of life when they are unable to resist the injurious effects of impure foods. It is therefore of the utmost consequence that inspection should be made of cows supplying the milk, to see that they are healthy; and that they get a good supply of pure water; that they are properly housed and cared for; that cleanliness should be observed in handling the milk, as it is impossible to be too particular about this one article of diet.

The Board of Health, as guardians of the public health, with the co-operation of the Town Council, are in duty bound to use every precaution to insure a wholesome supply of meat, water and milk to our citizens.

A Public Abattoir.

The advisability of having a public abattoir for the slaughter of all cattle for use as food was discussed at some length. To right present conditions in butchering, a public abattoir, where all animals must be killed under proper conditions ,was considered the only proper plan. The slaughterhouses were not kept in right condi-

The question of having an inspector of slaughter-houses was also touched on. The Health Officer had made one inspection this year, and another will also be made in the near future.

The Milk Supply.

Mr. Keith brought up the question of the conditions under which cows are kept in town. The improper housing, the improper feeding and care could not help but result in injury to the public health, as milk was an important article of diet. A closer inspection of the sources of the milk supply should be made in the interests of the public, Mr. Keith thought.

Mr. Mills-"How do you expect to get pure milk when cows drink out of the river, where it is known that the water is polluted?"

Mr. O'Reilly-"Oh, the cows have an ozone system inside."

Mr. Keith believed that many of the cows were infected with tuberculosis and that huildings and premises should be inspected and the owners made to comply with the law.
