Toronto Live Stock. TORONTO, Dec. 8.—Receipts of live stock at the City Market, as reported by the railways, were 112 carloads, consisting of 865 cattle, 876 hogs, 3004 sheep and lambs, with 50 calves.

Exporters. No export steers were reported as being on sale. A few export bulls sold from 2 1/2 to 4 1/2 per cwt.

Butchers. Prime picked lots of butchers are worth 34.20 to 35; the bulk of the best cattle offered sold at 32.50 to 34.50.

Feeders and Stockers. H. and W. Murby reported the market for stockers and feeders as being quiet, as usual on Tuesday.

Milkers and Springers. The market for milkers and springers has lost its vim, although choice quality cows still bring a good price.

Veal Calves. The market for veal calves was firm at 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs. There was a large delivery of sheep and lambs, 300 and over, but this did not cause the market to weaken.

Hogs. Mr. Harris quoted selected fed and watered at the market at 38; lights at 35.75.

DELEGATION OF COAL OPERATORS WILL URGE CONGRESS TO WIPE OUT DUTIES BOTH WAYS. Pittsburgh, Dec. 5.—A strong deputation of Pittsburgh coal operators, armed with a "brief" in favor of free coal with Canada, will leave for Washington in a few days, to go before the Ways and Means Committee.

The argument recites that the coal markets of Western Pennsylvania have gradually been contracted by the opening up of other coal fields, and some outlet other than the old markets must be found.

THE SWINDLERS WERE DETECTED AND EACH WAS FINED \$25 AND COSTS. Toronto, Dec. 5.—A giant scheme for enriching two Toronto merchants at the expense of their customers and in defiance of the Dominion Government's pure food laws, was brought to light yesterday by the appearance of John Lyons, grocer, of 587 Dundas-st. and William Duckworth in the police court, before Magistrate Denison.

For some months, Dominion Inspector D. A. McPherson, whose duty it is to enforce the food laws, has been trying to run a clever but criminal trick to his source. Consignments of dairy butter were being received in Toronto from Grand Valley, Ont., but without any city address.
