Want Free Exchange Of Coal With Canada

TORS WILL URGE CONGRESS TO WIPE OUT DUTIES BOTH WAYS.

Pittsburg, Dec. 5.-A strong deputa-Ways and Means Committee. They have communicated with Congressman Dallzell, and have received an assurance that such a movement would be favorably heard.

The communication sent to Washington by the Pittsburg operators says the petition for reciprocal coal with Canada is favored by mining interests representing 35,000,000 tons' production. They urge that such a treaty would be of vast benefit to the Pittsburg district and Western Pennsylvania, the logical section to supply the Canadian market.

The argument recites that the coal markets of Western Pennsylvania have gradually been contracted by the opening up of other coal fields, and some outlet other than the old markets must be found. The removal of the coal duty between Canada and the United States would benefit more men than any other single act, between these points. Nova Scotia coal, it was held, would not prove serious factor in New England, as that coal was rapidly finding better markets as bunker coal. The duty on coal into Canada is now 53 cents a ton, and with this removed industries in Canada would expand, and the con-
