Constable Tells of Robberies Con-

ducted by the Chief and Himself (Special to The Free Press.)

Simcoe, Dec. 30.-Ex-Chief of Police A. W. Malone was committed for trial at the Assizes in February by Magistrate John Beemer yesterday afternoon on a charge of attempting to murder Constable Wm. Wilkins in Lynwood Park shortly after midnight Dec. 1. When the magistrate announced his

intention of sending the accused up for trial a decided murmur of approval swept over the 1,500 spectators. But the real climax was reached when, after Mr. Kelly had entered another impressed plea for bail on the ground that Constable Wilkins, who laid the charge, was admittedly a thief and as deserving of being locked up as the prisoner, the venerable magistrate refused. Thunderous cheering and applause shook the auditorium as the vast crowd gave vent to its long pent up feelings. It was fully
