TOWN TOPICS

Gradually the machinery is being turned at the Sylvester Foundry again, the moulding department is in full swing now. Mr. Andrew Graham, county constable of Manvers, died on Dec. 28th, at his home in that township. The deceased was well known in town. Mr. Geo. S. Patrick, secretary-treasurer of the Public Library Board, is filling Mr. D. R. Anderson's position as Court Clerk during the illness of Mr. Anderson. Mayor H. Rush, of Peterboro, has been again elected to the Mayor's chair in that city, this time by acclamation. Over forty nominations were made for aldermen. There is about six or seven inches of snow on the river and the town trustees are running in opposition to the Parkin skating rink by forming teams all over the river. Among the companies whose incorporation was announced, under provincial charter, in Saturday's Ontario Gazette is The Peterborough Examiner, Peterborough, Ont., with a capitalization of \$100,000. The boy who was held on the charge of burning the barns of Mr. T. B. Laidley, has been adopted by Mr. Collins, of Sunderland. Magistrate Moore allowed the boy out on suspended sentence, and Mr. Collins gave bonds for his appearance when desired by the Magistrate. The Canadian Machine Telephone Company seems to be making good in Peterboro and to be finding a large measure of popular favor, if the measure of the patronage is to be considered as evidence. The Canadian Machine Telephone Company have recently issued new lists of subscribers for their Peterboro service, and it has 35 more names on it than the list issued a few months ago. Monday afternoon about 4 o'clock a rather bad spill occurred on the C.P.R. line, about three miles from Peterboro. The accident happened to a freight train, and it appears was caused by two of the wheels breaking off one of the trucks. Several cars were piled up, but nobody was hurt. An auxiliary was sent out from Peterboro to clear the track, but traffic was held up for nearly three hours. Bobcaygeon Independent:—The adjourned meeting of the Council was held on Friday evening, and the roll accepted from the collector, having been fully met. With Mr. Arbery in the chair, a vote of thanks was given the reverend for the deep interest he had taken during the year in the administration of the village affairs and Mr. Byng responded, thanking them for their kindly appreciation, and also for the unusual regularity and punctuality shown this year by the council. The case came up last week before the local magistrates in Cannington, and was adjourned for a week, the magistrates in the meantime to learn if the defendant's attorney was correct in his contention that the local magistrates were not empowered by law to deal with the case, as they were only justices of the peace and a matter of title was involved which placed the case beyond their jurisdiction. What might have resulted in a doctor's bill or even a hospital bill, took place Sunday afternoon, when two young men were driving about town behind a spirited horse, and on reaching Wellington-st., near Victoria-ave. about 4.45, started up their horse at a furious rate. On turning Wellington and Victoria-ave. corner, the animal could not be brought to a stop, swerving around the corner, with the result that the cutter upset, throwing the sporty young men out and into the ditch. The driver hung onto the reins and was dragged for about a block beside the overturned cutter, but two town citizens succeeded in bringing the frightened animal to a stop. The young countrymen, after cleaning out the cutter and securing their belongings, which had been left in the ditch behind, left for their home south of the town.
