LINDSAY POLICE AFFAIRS.

We are continually receiving enquiries from our readers why the police court proceedings are not pub-Mished in the Post as they occur, and to our correspondents and the public an explanation is due.

· Police Magistrate Jackson and Chief Constable Vincent are adopting a course that has never been practised by the police of Lindsay before, or by the police of any other town or city we know of, viz., only giving the press the most meagre informat. tion conterning some cases before the court, and suppressing all first ofience cases and special cases that they apparently wish to be particu. larly lement with. Naturally very Mitt'e police news filters through to der the parental roof. the press.

We believe the publication of the police court proceedings has a great er influence upon offenders than the Magistrate's almost private court, are not alone in our opinion.

The police court is held at irregufar intervals, and it is is not always convenient to have a recorter at every session of the court. It is the duty of the Chief of Police to furnish accurate and full information of the cases before the court, particularly when the police books are not accessible to the reporters.

4 Here is a case in point : On Christ. mas eve a load of hay was stolen almost from under the night constable's nose, close to Kent-st. Each day since then our reporter, when asking the Chief for police news, hus secured the same reply-"Nothing doing."
