Victoria Farmers Saved Thousands

Re Pakenham Pork Packing Company Limited, Liquidation.
The liquidation of this Company has been finally closed. The property has realized enough to pay the creditors 40c. on the dollar, but nothing whatever for the shareholders. Fortunately for the shareholders in this locality, Mr. R. J. McLaughlin, K.C., who acted for them, raised the point shortly after the liquidation, that the preferred stock of the Company had not been legally created, and that there were really no preferred shareholders, but that the people who paid money in for preferred stock were entitled to sue for their money back, and consequently to rank as creditors. As a result he has succeeded in ranking some sixty-five parties as creditors for the amount that they paid for preferred stock, and they are now getting 40c. on the dollar, the same rate as the bank and trade creditors are being paid. Shareholders who neglected to repudiate their preferred stock and establish claims as creditors, get nothing.
The litigation has been carried on now for about five years. Some eight cases in all were tried as tests, three of which went to the Court of Appeal, all of which were decided in favor of the contention raised by Mr. McLaughlin. The effect of these decisions were also to relieve a large number of people in this vicinity who had subscribed for stock, from having to pay for it, and as a result of the whole litigation many thousands of dollars were saved to people of this county.

Had Relatives Here.

Evening Post of Jan. 4th
Mrs. B. Sloan, of Fielding, Sask., who was instantly killed in a railway accident on the C. P. R. yesterday morning west of Sudbury, was on her way east to visit her sister, Mrs. Johnston, of this town, wife of Spectator Robert Johnston, of the G. T.R., and other relatives in the vicinity of Valente, Mariposa. The body was sent to Fielding for interment. Deceased was the mother of a large family.

Could Not Identify Burke.

Charles Porteous, the farmer who was shot four times, in the head by an unknown highwayman at Cavansville, near Millbrook, Ont., early in December went to Toronto on Monday to see Chas. Burke, whom the local police have in custody on a charge of vagrancy. When Porteous saw him he could not be sure that Burke was the man, as the shooting took place in the stable, and he was unable to get a good look at his assailant.
