Uncleanliness in the Dairy.
(Toronto Star.)

Only one-half of the dairies of cheese factories in Eastern Ontario have proper appliances for cooling milk before delivery. Ninety per cent of the cheese delivered in Montreal last year was not clean in flavor. During 1907 no less than 149 convictions for adulteration were recorded against those engaged in supplying milk from which Eastern Ontario cheese is made.

These were the three most striking statements made in the report presented at the Eastern Ontario Dairy convention held at Picton last week. The two first clearly indicate that, despite all the educational effort of past years, much yet remains to be accomplished before our dairy industry reaches the standard of efficiency it should attain. Still more deplorable is the evidence brought out as to the number of dishonest patrons. True, less than 150 convictions among 36,000 individuals is not a very high percentage, but it is higher than it should be. The patron of a cheese factory who waters or skims his milk endeavors to obtain something at the expense of his neighbors who are cooperating with him in the business of that factory. He might just as honestly go to his neighbor's field and steal his sheep, or enter the barn and take away part of the contents of the granary.

It is quite evident that more education is required in the work of production, but there is need also of the preaching of plain, old-fashioned honesty, and in this work the church and the school should assist the effort made by dairy instructors.

To Advertise Ontario.

Mr. E. Blake Robertson, of the Dominion Immigrant Department, has arrived in Toronto for the purpose of taking over the work of immigrant distribution, relinquished by the Province. By the rearrangement the Province will be able to devote a sum of \$18,000 a year to the work of advertising the Province and its resources in Great Britain. At the present time the Dominion Government have 118 employment agents in the Province, and the work of placing immigrants will be undertaken by them. Mr. Robertson will only be in charge of the Toronto office temporarily, and will be succeeded by Mr. F. Stewart, who is at present in England.
