Who, for example would claim that Rockefeller is more helpful, socially, than Carnegie? Yet, Rockefeller is a devout Baptist, while Carnegie is commonly reported to be an avowed infidel. But what reason is there to hope that even these motives will be forthcoming on any large scale from the organized church life of the present day? Is it not true that quite a joit of our current religion has now no altruistic value whatever, being confined to the individual's selfish effort to flee from the wrath to come.
