One we enter into it, there can loe no such thing as turn and they see the more populous centres getting it, there will be blood on the moon for someoody. In the U. S. the vacant lands are practically all taken up, and there are postal routes and post offices in every part of the land. In starting the rural delivery, they are able to do so without detriment to the newer and more sparsely settled districts. The rapid increase in the outgo, however, just goes to show how each congressional district will insist on getting its share of the service, and before they know it, they will have an item of expense on their hands that will throw the pension bill into the shade One notable difference will be, that in rural delivery the people will a getting service for the money gaid, and in the other they are not. W must not imagine, however, that the morey they are spending on rural delivery is all expense. Just at present the scheme is in its infancy, and it will take years for the officials to find out the best and chearest way to manipulate the district. In the meanwhile it is a case of grain with each congressman for his own district, and those with the most pertinacity get there, whilst the more

modest have to wait. As far as we can gather, the plan is to take a rural district with say six gost offices in it, a'bolish the oft fices and have one central one to which all the mail for that district is addressed. Every ferson in the district is supposed to have a properly constructed loox on the road, in which they post their own matter, and into which the touring car guts any matter for them. All our readers can see at a glance what a convenience this would be to the farmer. He would get his daily paper, and with that and the telephone and city plumbing, he would be in clover sure. It is a well known fact that every convenience brought into use, encourages the use of the rost office service almormally. We need only glance at the erormous increase in our own, by the reduction of the postage from three to two cents, and within the gast year the reduction on magazine restage between G. B. and ourselves. There is no doubt in the world, but that this gural deliver in the States will so increase the revenue, that in all but sparsely settled districts it will start to gay very shortly after
