During 1907 the County Council spent on bridges nearly \$10,000. One regular feature in the Municipal Act regarding bridges is that any municipality outside of a town can call on the county to build a bridge, if 300 feet or over, and the county is compelled to do it.

One item about which there is a good deal of dispute as to who pays it, is the hospital grant. In 1906 it was \$1200 from the county, and in 1907 \$1100. Of that amount Lindsay's share is about \$170, leaving \$930 actually paid by the county outside of Lindsay.

There is one point in which Council can do a lot to help the town, and that is in being honest and living up to their agreements. A corporate body has just as much right to be honest and have their word as good as their bond as an individual.

Rural postal delivery is a question that is bound to loom up largely during the next few years. In a country such as ours it is a different question entirely from what it is in older and smaller countries, such as they have in Europe.

We must not imagine, however, that the money they are spending on rural delivery is all expense. Just at present the scheme is in its infancy, and it will take years for the officials to find out the best and cheapest way to manipulate the district.
