Hawkesbury Syrian Is Slain After Quarrel Over Money.

GIRL IS FATALLY WOUNDED

Because His Brother Would Not Lend Him Funds With Which to Start Ih Business Salem Assaly, a Peddler, Kills Him and Then Turns Revolver on Cousin-The Mur-

derer Escapes In Confusion. Hawkesbury, Dec. 29 .- J. M. Assaly !. merchant, of this town, was fatally. shot here last night about 6.30 by his

brother, Salem Assaly. The murderer then turned the revolver on a lady, who was a cousin both, and fired one shot at her, which took effect at the base of her

Both victims are still living, but the doctors hold no hope of recovery. M. Assaly, one of the victims, had been a resident of this town for the past five years, and was a model tizen. The lady, who was shot, was only recently from Syria. The three

lived in a house on Regent street. Salem Assaly has been peddling goods, which, he obtained from his brother, and for some time has worried the latter for money to start a business for himself. The refusal led to frequent quarrels,

Salem again last night demanded money as the three sat at the table and being refused, jumped up, drew revolver and shot both. In the confusion Salem Assaly caped, but it is thought he wil

captured.

Grain Shipments. Ottawa, Dec. 29.-The Trade and Commerce Department states that o the crop of 1908 there were shipped from Port Arthur and Fort William up to the close of navigation on Dec. 12: 43,935,596 bushels of grain, as compared with 23,482,497 in the corresponding period of last year. Wheat shipments amounted to 36,017,483 bushels, as against 20,545,850; oats, 5,953,201, as against 2,040,620; barley

1,460,864, as against 578,523; and flax, 517,913, as against 317,493 bushels. Of the season's wheat output from Fort William and Port Arthur, 593, 374 bushels were carried in Canadian vessels and 12:418;109 in foreign

vessels to United States points. Canadian vessels also carried 1,186, 196 bushels of wheat to Buffalo, so that in all 13,604,605 bushels of Canadian wheat; or a total of 16,286,157 bushels of grain, found their way to export points via United States route.
