Strathcona Will Stay.

Montreal, Dec. 29.—Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, who recently arrived from London, where he has been negotiating with the Imperial authorities on the cheap cable proposition, made an important statement touching the rumored retirement of Lord Strathcona from the High Commissionership last

There is, he declared, not a foundation for the many stories going the rounds of newspapers on both sides of the Atlantic regarding the retirement of Lord Strathcona. The Canadian High Commissioner, Mr. Lemieux stated, will, if he so desires, remain in London as the representative of the Dominion as long as there is breath in his body.

C.P.R. to Build to Gowganda. He says he has "seen the organization of the Roman Church secure better results with a given sum of money than other church organizations are accustomed
