The conductor pumped down to Fenelon Falls on a handcar and telegraphed to Lindsay for another engine, which was at once despatched and the impatient travellers were brought down as quickly as possible.

As it was, they were compelled to stay in town over night. On the way down Conductor White had no very enviable time of it trying to placate his passengers.

Mrs. Cathro's solo "Qui Tollis" and the "Et Incarnatus Est," by Miss Mary Fleury, together with the solos by Misses L. Shannon, Ella Brady, N. O'Boyle, and Mr. J. Hurley were splendidly rendered. At the beginning of the thanksgiving mass, Miss M. Fleury rendered that vocal prayer, "Glorious Morn" and also the solo, urging the different masses in "Adeste Fideles," "The Pastoris," a beautiful arrangement, was also rendered during the masses. Miss Lena Shannon taking the solo at benediction, Roeswig's "O Salutaris," was sung by Miss M. Fleury.
