After the flames had eaten up everything of an inflammable nature, and the embers had burned low, the bones of the unfortunate man were found in the de-

The deceased was a brother of Dr. Harold B. Ross, of Toronto, and he has besides three other brothers. His sons are John, of Toronto; Ross H., and Duncan, of Tory Hill. Mrs. Jas. E. Finley, formerly of Burnt River, but now of Tory Hill, is a daughter and another daughter lived with the deceased. His wife was visiting in Toronto at the time of the fire.

Mr. Anderson owned the public hall at Tory Hill, and was present at an entertainment given the previous night by a ventriloquist from Toronto. After the concert a dance was given, and Mr. Anderson did not get home until four o'clock. It is supposed that the fire was caused by the overturning of a lamp.

Dr. Giles, of Haliburton, coroner, did not deem an inquest necessary.

An Italian Fight at North Bay Causes Heavy Loss.

OCCUPANTS BARELY ESCAPE

Stabbing of Man Named Amanda Is Followed by Fierce Factional War Resulting In Burning on Sunday of Store Belonging to Carmen Sandrelli - Property Loss Is \$5,000 - Money Burned,

North Bay, Dec. 28.-Early Sunday morning the store and dwelling of Carmen Sandrelli, Italian merchant, was burned to the ground, the occupants barely escaping with their lives. So quickly did the flames spread that nothing could be saved, and cash amounting to \$350 was burned. The loss on the building is \$5,000; contents \$1,000; grocery stock \$1,500; insurance \$4,250.

The cause of the fire is attributed to incendiarism on account of the fierce feud existing between the Italian factions here which was intensified recently by the murderous stabbing affray in which an Italian named Amanda escaped death by a narrow margin. Amanda's deposition accused Sandrelli of the stabbing, but evidence was given throwing the blame on another Italian who left town the night of the affray, and Sandrelli was acquitted. Amanda is recovering and still accuses Sandrelli.

Revolutionists Fight Troops. Moscow, Dec. 28.-Baron Cotte, chief of the secret political police, was killed and Col. Muraki was wounded in a fierce encounter on Saturday with revolutionists who were entrenched in

a suburban villa. Artillery was finally brought bombard the place, which was taken at four o'clock in the afternoon, after holding out for 24 hours.

The attacking party were astounded to find only a single body inside the building, which was identified as that of the well-known revolutionist, Tehernoff, head of the central con mittee of social revolutionists, who, with a comrade named Siderkin, fired 80 rounds of ammunition from Mauser

Tehernoff killed himself with the last round. Siderkin was captured, having been seriously wounded. The Government casualties were two killed and five wounded.

# St. Mary's Fire

Willing Workers Prepare Church for Service on Christmas Day

Thursday was a busy day at St. Mary's church, where willing workers labored all day and well on into the night in order to get the church in readiness for the Christmas services. The statues, pictures, and altar decorations which had been removed the evening of the fire, were placed

in position. The church on Christmas did not show any of the disastrous effects of the fire, save for the blackened portion of the walls above the doors. leading from the sacristy to the altar The statues in the niches above the altar also bore mute evidence that the fire had penetrated the interior of the church. The slight smell of smoke that prevaded the edifice did not inconvenience the large congregations which assembled at the masses

during the day. The sacristy has been cleared of all debris and the windows nailed up for the present. It is expected that the work of rebuilding this portion of the church will commence at an ear-

The scene of the fire was visited on Thursday by a large number of the congregation, especially those from the country, and all were thankful that conditions were not more serious and that the main portion of the edifice had not been consumed.

### Funeral of Miss Tilly O'Neil

The funeral of the late Miss Tillie O'Neill, whose death occurred in Rochester on Thursday took place this morning from the residence of Mr. Daniel Costello, of Emily, and was attended by a large concourse of friends. The cortege proceeded to St. Lukes church Downeyville, where Rev. Father McGuire conducted the funeral services, and also referred to the exemplary life of the deceased, and how well prepared she was to meet the call of death. Interment took place in the parish cemetery. Among (hose who attended the funeral from a distance were; Sister Thecla, of St. Joseph's community, Peterboro, and Miss O'Neill, of Rochester, sister of the deceased.

### Not as Bad as Reported

The accident to a G. T. R. engine near Fells' station Wednesday night was not as serious as reported. The crown sheet of the engine did not blow out, but an arch tube became detached from the crown sheet, thereby allowing the water and steam to escape in the fire box, causing consternation to the engine crew but when investigated did not prove very serious as the damage was repaired inside of three hours, and the engine again in commussion.
