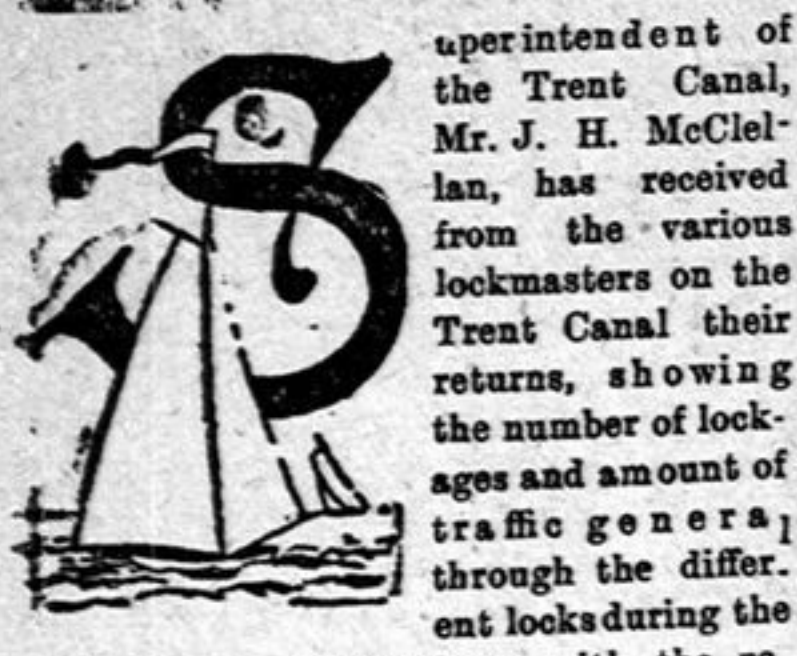


# Year's Business on Trent Canal

### Superintendent McClellan Furnishes a Statement of Lockages and Tonnage for the Past Season



Superintendent of the Trent Canal, Mr. J. H. McClellan, has received from the various lockmasters on the Trent Canal their returns, showing the number of lockages and amount of traffic generated through the different locks during the past season. Comparisons with the returns of other years show that the past year has been the busiest year on the Trent Canal.

### ROSEDALE LOCK.

A. A. Sackett, acting lockmaster. A substantial new lock, much larger than the old wooden lock formerly at this place is now about completed. A splendid new concrete dam is also being constructed at Rosedale. Balsam Lake just above the Rosedale Lock, constitutes the summit waters of the Trent Canal. From Balsam Lake the waters of the Trent Canal flow eastward to Lake Ontario. While the artificial stretch from Balsam Lake to Lake Simcoe carries a very slight portion of the water from Balsam Lake to Georgian Bay.

### BOBCAYGEON LOCK.

John J. Walker, Lockmaster. The lockages at Bobcaygeon during the past year totalled 826, a slight decrease over the number of lockages during the preceding year. It might be noted however, that this decrease was not in connection with the steamboat traffic, but in the matter of the number of scows that were locked through during the past year, and also in the matter of the number of rafts. In 1907 the number of rafts locked through at Bobcaygeon totalled 363, wherein this year they dropped to 225. The number of steamboats passing through this lock during the past year showed an increase of 25 over the season of 1907.

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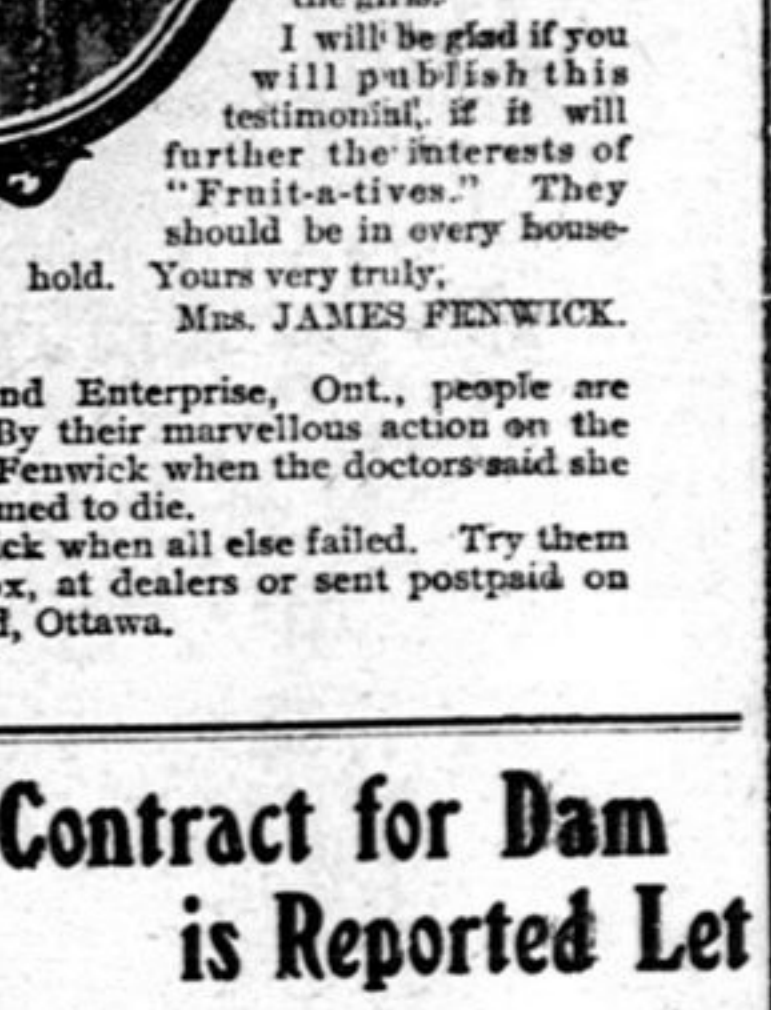
