IMPORTANT NEWS OF THE DISTRICT

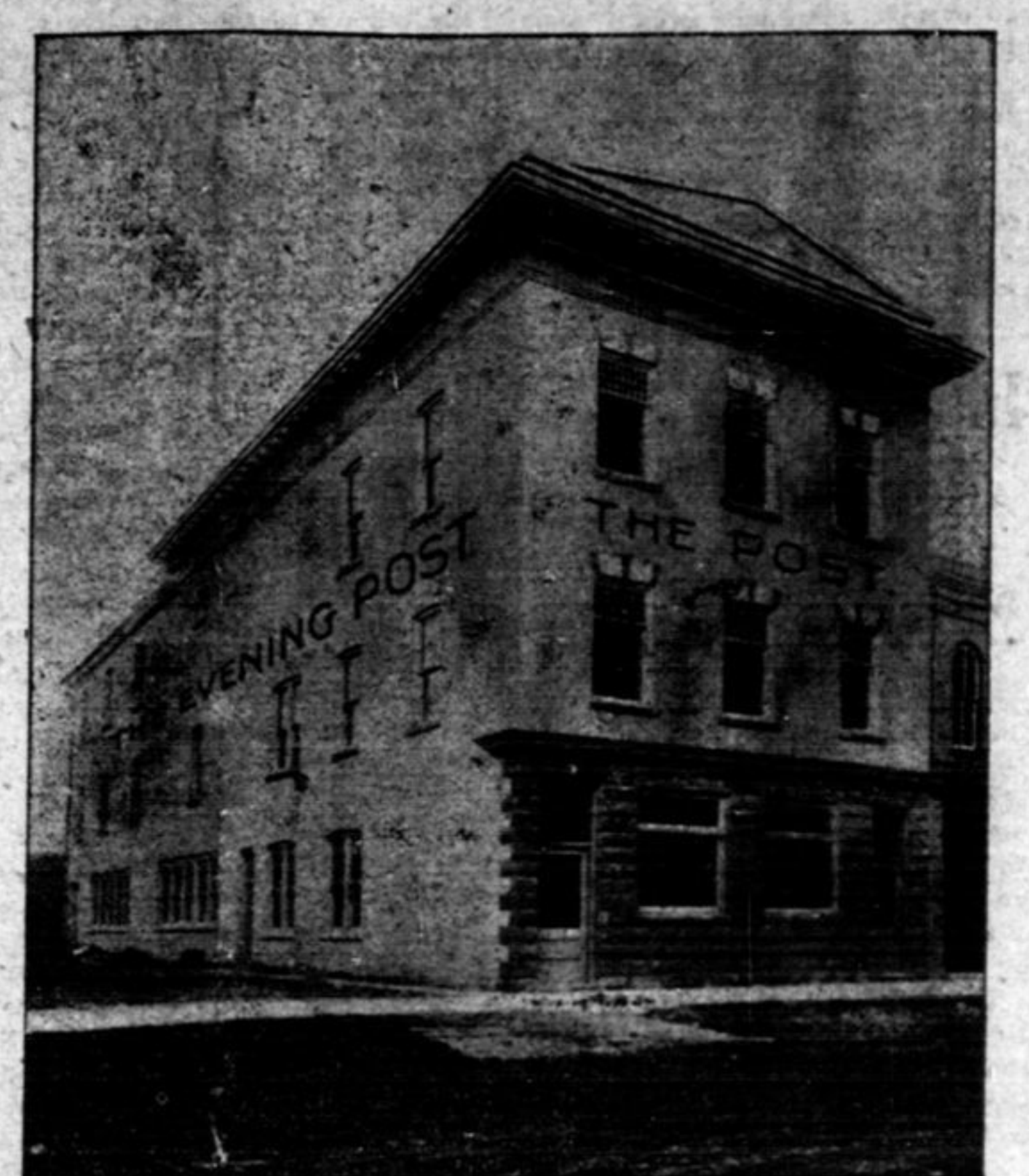
Told in Interesting Form by the Bright Correspondents of The Post at the Various Centres.
