

Carnival at Little Britain

A Most Enjoyable and Very Successful Affair

The carnival held on the evening of Jan. 14th on the Maple Leaf rink Little Britain, was a financial success. The night was a poor one and the crowd was a good one. The bills, which were written and designed by Mr. F. H. Moore, proved that there is a right and a wrong way to bring a good crowd on a poor night. DIRECTORS' REPORT

The directors' report was read as follows:

To the shareholders of the Lindsay Cemetery Co.

The members of the company beg to report for the past year as follows:

The company was incorporated Aug 24th, 1870, under the act respecting cemetery companies, and was registered Sept. 10th, 1870. They are the owners of the cemetery known as the Riverside cemetery, situated in the township of Ops, being composed of half of lot 12, in the fifth concession of the said township of Ops, lying east of the Scugog river and containing 13 acres more or less. Half an acre of the 13th is leased from the township of Ops for 99 years, dating from Oct. 1st, 1873.

Three Days' Study in Subjects of Vital Concern to Farmers

Beginning next Tuesday, a three days' course in stock and seed judging will be held at the town hall and Academy of Music under the auspices of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

SEED JUDGING.

From 9 to 10.25 each day will be devoted to the study of the principal grain and fodder crops of Ontario. Lectures will be given on Methods of Cultivation, Methods of Cleaning, Selecting and Testing Seed. Special attention being given to our country. This course is to be under the direction of Prof. C. A. Zavitz, of the Ontario Agricultural College.

JUDGING LIVE STOCK

This course will be conducted by Professor G. E. Day, of the Ontario Agricultural College, assisted by Dr. H. G. Reed and other prominent stockmen.

Tuesday Jan. 26th—10.30 a.m.—Beef cattle; score card—1.30 p.m.—Breeding classes, heifers and cows.

Wednesday, January 27th—10.30—Bulls, aged—1.30 p.m.—Young bulls and fat steers.

Thursday, January 28th—10.30 a.m.—Sheep; score card—1.30 p.m.—Breeding classes, shrops, cotswoolds, and Leicester.

Friday, Jan. 29th—10.30 a.m.—Draught horses; score card—1.30 p.m.—Market and breeding classes.

Saturday, January 30th—10.30 a.m.—Light horses; score card—1.30 p.m.—Harness horses.

LECTURES

At the close of the practical work, or from 4 to 5 o'clock each day lectures on breeding, feeding and management of live stock will be given, by competent men, who are regarded as authorities on the various classes and breeds of farm animals. Addresses on unsoundness in horses, and on some common diseases of farm animals will be given by Dr. Reed.
