The heads of the different committees were also instructed to issue orders as far as possible for goods secured.
The People and Our Institutions
Mr. R. M. Beal Contends that People Should Have Free Use of the Public Buildings
At last night's meeting of the town council Mr. R. M. Beal interviewed the council in reference to securing the town hall for a course of three lectures to be delivered by Rev. Stitt Wilson, the Socialist orator. He stated that he had heard it remarked that the local option people had to pay for the use of the hall and if so it was wrong. All groups of our citizens should have free use of public property, and he was always going to fight for that contention. We spread hundreds of dollars on our streets, and because some used them more than he did, he was not going to kick. The same argument also applied to the public library. There was an institution on the hill, Mr. Beal said, that would cost the town considerable money this year, and yet not more than three per cent. of the inhabitants will use it. Any body of our citizens wanting to use our public buildings should be given the privilege without charge. In the game of profit, he said, he came out of it all right, but he was talking for a class of people who were dispossessed.
Mayor Begg said it was a rule of the council to charge all bodies for the use of the hall, and if it was given to the Socialists free, the Salvation Army, Foresters or some other organization would naturally expect the same treatment.
Mr. Beal—These are profit making institutions. The Socialists might be considered crazy, but they are not out for money.
Ald. Jackson—The big guns in the movement make the money.
Mr. Beal—Not at all. Many of them are often found with an empty pocket and empty stomach.
It was finally decided on motion of Messrs. McLean and Howkins, to give the Socialists the use of the hall on condition that they pay for the heating and lighting of same.
