### OPS COUNCIL

The members elect of Ops Council for 1911, viz., Reeve Peter Hawkins, and Councillors Wm. Best, F. W. Hickson, D. W. Terrill and Wesley Waldo, met in the Council Chamber Jan. 9th at 11 a.m.

After taking the declaration of qualification and of office the members took their seats and were addressed by Reeve Hawkins, who congratulated the members on their election and expressed the hope that the year 1911 would be a successful one and that all their deliberations around Council Board might be carried out with harmony and good will and in the best interests of the Township. He wanted that each member should keep a careful record of every dollar spent in his division and of every day's work done so that each commissioner could, at the end of the year, present a clear and a detailed statement of his work during the entire year.

Council then began the business of 1911 by having the minutes of the last meeting of the 1910 Council read, and on motion of W. Walden and F. W. Hickson these were confirmed.

**COMMUNICATIONS**

From the Municipal Association; From the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, asking for a donation; From John T. Currins, applying for position as Assessor for 1911, a conditional application from James McLean for same position, and an application for Auditor from John J. Twobey; Walter Lee, the other applicant for Auditor, belonging to the Township, had applied personally; F. H. Kidd, of Lindsay, also applied for the position of Auditor.

On motion of F. W. Hickson, seconded by D. W. Terrill, Mr. J. T. Currins was appointed assessor for the year 1911.

Council then adjourned for dinner, On resuming, another application for assessor was laid on the table from Mr. A. C. Reid, but it was too late to be considered.

Moved by W. Walden, seconded by W. Best, that John J. Twobey and Walter Lee be appointed auditors of the 1910 accounts.—Carried.

On motion of D. W. Terrill, and F. W. Hickson, Mr. James Connolly was reappointed member of the Ops Board of Health for a period of three years.

On motion of W. Walden, seconded by W. Best, the Clerk was instructed to order one 24 in. plain tile mould to be shipped to Lindsay.

The by-laws appointing the Road Commissioners and confirming the appointments to office, were duly passed Mr. Best in the chair for the second reading in committee.

On motion of D. W. Terrill, seconded by F. W. Hickson, the Clerk was authorized to apply to the County for the use of the stone crusher for the season of 1911, and also was instructed to order copies of the Municipal World for the use of the members.

Best—Walden: That an advance of \$500 be appropriated for roads and bridges, to be divided equally among the different commissioners, also the balance in each division from 1910.

On motion of W. Walden, seconded by F. W. Hickson, the following accounts were ordered to be paid:

The Post, for printing financial statements, the ballots and advertising nomination \$35.50; G. W. Beal, for account rendered Dec. 31st, including election supplies, stationery, etc. \$11.46; Deputy Returning officers, poll clerks and poll booths in the 6 polling places \$60; Jas. McCausland for cleaning Township Hall and providing fire for 1910 election, \$1.50; Stewart & O'Connor, bill for 1910 for legal services \$45.87 and of the Ottawa firm of solicitors, who pleaded the Township's case before the Board of Railway Commissioners on the Hutton Grove crossing question, \$40.

On motion of W. Best and D. W. Terrill a grant of \$5 was made to the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto.

Commissioners for 1911 are—Div. 1, W. Walden; Div. 2—D. W. Terrill; Div. 3—Reeve Hawkins; Div. 4—W. Best; Div. 5—F. W. Hickson.

Council adjourned to meet Feb. 13, at 1.30 p.m.
