## DOOR OF HANDSOME QUARTERS OPENED WITH A GOLD KEY

(From Thursday's Post). This afternoon the opening of "The Annie Ross Nurses' Home," an event which has been looked forward to with pleasurable anticipation by our citizens, took place, and the occasion marked an epoch in the history of the town.

The ceremonies in connection with this important function attracted a large gathering composed of the leading citizens of the town and the county, and was graced by the presence of the town's honored and generous benefactor, Mr. James Ross Mrs. Ross, their son, Mr. J.K.L. Ross, and Mrs. Ross, all of Montreal; Mr. Herman Watson, of Galt; Lady MacKenzie, Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Grace, of Toronto.

At 1.15 o'clock the Board of Governors of the Ross Memorial Hospital consisting of Messrs J. D. Flavell, chairman; J. R. McNeillie, secretary; John Carew, Thos. Stewart, and ex-Mayor Begg, met Mr. and Mrs. James Ross and visitors at the Hospital, when the control of the Nurses' Home, was invested in the Board by Mr. Ross, Mr. J. D. Flavell, chairman, presented Mrs. Ross with a gold key, and Mr. Ross formally unlocked the door for the staff of nurses.

AT THE ACADEMY. At two o'clock the public proceedings in the Academy of Music attracted a large gathering of citizens. Mr. J. D. Flavell took the chair and the following address was read by Mr. J. R. McNeillie, secretary of the Board of Governors:

Following the reply to the address by Mr. Ross, a number of prominent citizens delivered addresses.

TO JAMES ROSS, Esquire: "The Citizens of the County of Victoria and the Town of Lindsay, and the resident Governors of the Ross Memorial Hospital, desire to approach you with expressions of renewed and ever increasing gratitude.

"We have assembled to-day to celebrate the completion of the Home for the Nurses of the Hospital which you have so generously added to the Institution. You have been pleased to content that the new building shall bear the name of your gracious wife, and we are much gratified that it shall thus be known as 'the Annie Ross Nurses' Home.'"

"Eight years ago we received from your hands the magnificent Hospital, which you have erected and equipped with the utmost completeness, an enduring monument to the revered memory of your father and mother, who have been honored fellow-citizens.

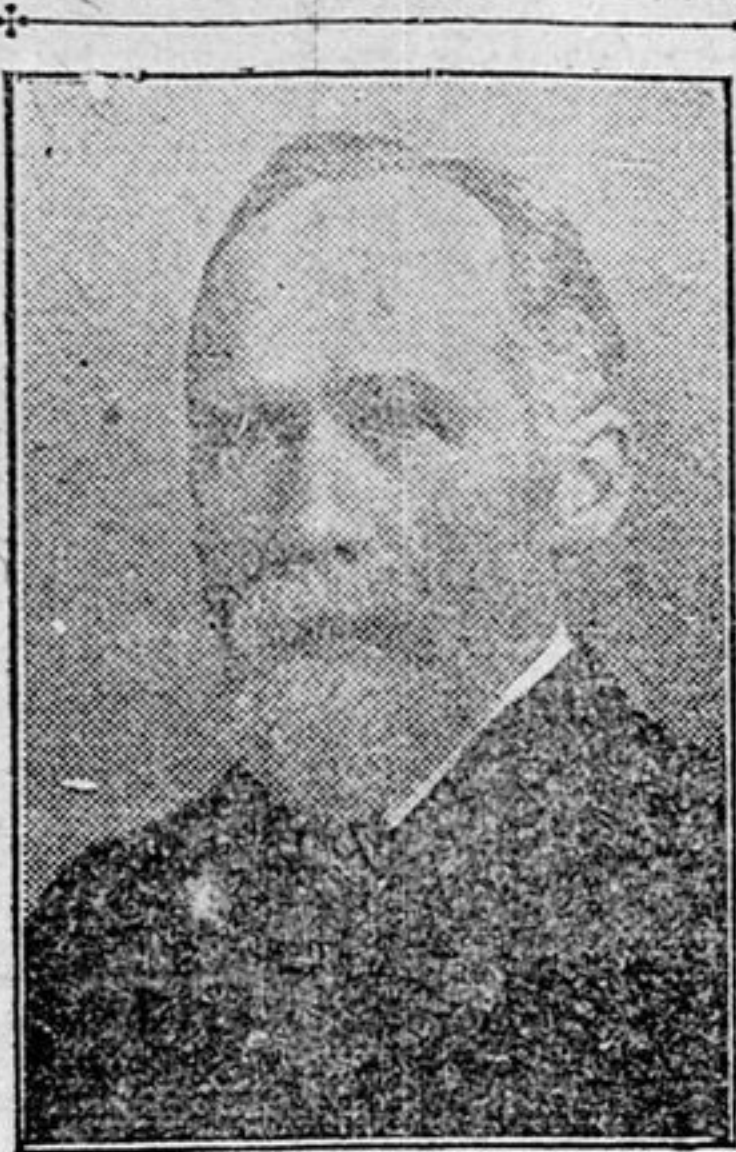
"We deem it fitting on this occasion to recall that your own home was in Lindsay for a number of years and that the town is the birthplace of your son, who, with his wife, joins with yourself and Mrs. Ross in earnest devotion to the interests of the institution you have founded for the benefit of the County of Victoria and its seat of municipal government.

"The period of your early association with the County of Victoria marked the beginning of the career in which you attained such deserved eminence a few years later as a pathfinder through the western mountains of Canada and as a builder of the first Canadian Railway to the Pacific ocean.

"Although so intensely occupied with the great material affairs of the Dominion, you sought and found opportunity to devise and bring into exercise the means whereby the most efficient and helpful service can be rendered to suffering men and women and children.

"The latter is what you bestowed upon the Governor, and physicians, and Nurses, and by your munificent bounty there has been accomplished a work the value of which cannot be measured by words.

"The Governors have not failed to

be profited by your counsel and advice when entering upon the control of the institution, and we venture to hope the precious talent committed to us has been so used to merit your approval. Your confidence has been an inspiration to the highest effort on our part to render to the people of the County of Victoria the benign service for which you have made such unique provision.

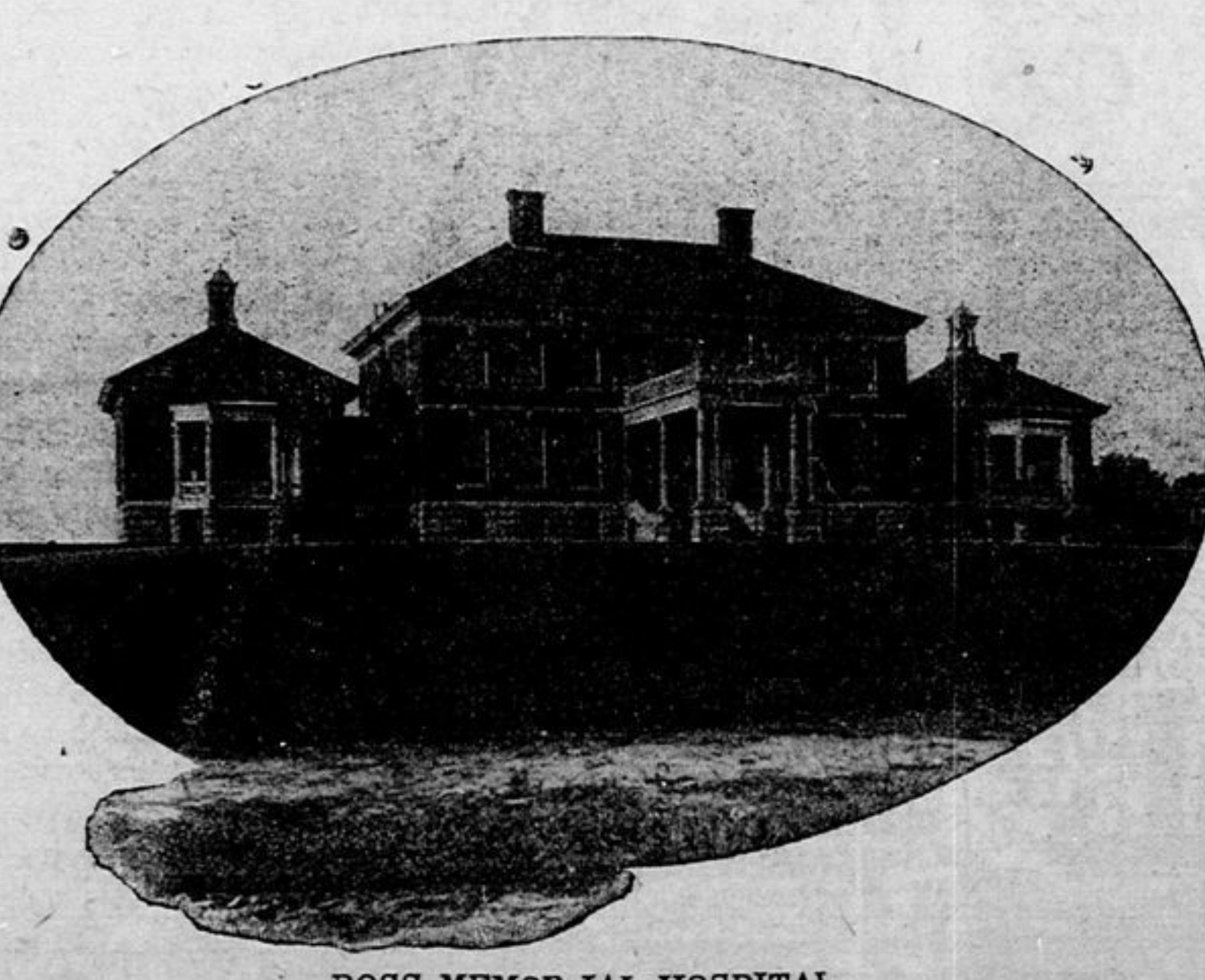
"Owing to the favor into which the Hospital has grown in the estimation of the physicians and their patients, the capacity of the building was taxed to the fullest extent for several years, with the result that the quarters occupied by the Lady Superintendent and her staff, were needed for the use of patients. When this condition came to your knowledge, you resolved that the staff should have a separate building for their accommodation, and during the year 1910, you erected and equipped the splendid building you have this

day invested in the Board of Governors.

"The County of Victoria and the Town of Lindsay in their corporate capacity, the citizens personally and through their churches, and the women of Lindsay banded as an auxiliary to the Board, have supported the Hospital with such loyalty in the intervening years since the doors were opened for the reception of patients, that the sources of income have supplied all the funds required for its maintenance in a state of efficiency. We desire that you will accept what has been done in this regard as an earnest that The Ross Memorial Hos-

pital and the Annie Ross Nurses' Home will be maintained in keeping with your own ideals and in order that the largest advantage may accrue to the community for whose welfare you have founded the institution in nobility and strength.

Today he manifested still further proof of that munificence and generosity by presentation to the Board of Governors of the Hospital a nurses' home which for neatness of design and architectural beauty is surpassed by few similar institutions in the Dominion. Mr. Ross also furnished the home, and the same generosity was displayed in this particular, as the furnishings are in keeping with every other feature of the institution.

## TRAFFIC AT THE LINDSAY LOCKS DURING THE SEASON OF 1910

The annual report of the traffic at the various locks on the Trent Canal for the season, 1910 has been issued by the Superintendent, of the Canal, J. H. McClellan. Traffic at nearly every lock shows an increase over the preceding year, and altogether the business on the canal was the largest in its history. Young's Point continues to be the busiest point on the entire system, there being a total of 2,634 lockages there during the season. The report of John Makins, lockmaster at Lindsay locks, is as follows:

TORONTO, JAN. 16.—(Special).—GENERAL MANAGER TRAVERS, OF THE DEFUNCT FARMERS BANK, WAS SENTENCED TO SIX YEARS IN THE PENITENTIARY THIS MORNING ON EACH OF THE THREE CHARGES TO WHICH HE PLEADED GUILTY, THE SENTENCES TO RUN CONCURRENTLY. MAGISTRATE DENISON, IN SENTENCING HIM, SAID THAT A BURGLAR MIGHT HAVE DONE LESS HARM. THE PRISONER SHOWED SIGNS OF SLEEPLESSNESS AND TOOK HIS SENTENCE WITHOUT WINCING. HE MADE NO STATEMENT.

## May Not Stop Bank Enquiry

There is much speculation as to whether Travers' change of front and admission of all the criminal charges preferred will shut off further inquiry into the affairs of the Farmers' Bank. It was learned on reliable authority that further revelations may be expected to be brought out at the meetings of the creditors and shareholders on Tuesday.

By that time Curator Clarkson will be in possession of all the facts, and will doubtless be questioned most fully by interested parties on all as yet unexplained transactions, which may throw light on the cause of the bank's failure.

Mr. McCrae assured the officer that action would be taken by the committee with a view to providing more satisfactory quarters and that the matter would be considered at an early date.

Adams, Mill-st., and will in a short time, be leaving for the States to accept a position on the continent, having left the ocean life, in which he has been engaged for the past few years.
