

Death's Harvest At Minden Village

(Special to The Post) Messrs. A. Cass and J. Donaldson who were manager and teller in the Minden branch of the Sterling bank, just closed left town for new quarters on Monday last.

Out of respect to the deceased, R. Campbell, the skating rink was closed from the time of his death until after his funeral, and a hockey match between Minden and Haliburton was cancelled on account of his death.

Mrs. Weese, aged 85 years and two months passed away early last Wednesday morning at the home of her son-in-law, Mr. Jas. Pogue.

Mrs. Weese was the relict of the late Frederick Weese, who died many years ago. She and her husband came from Germany to Montreal, and after a few years moved to the Township of Lutterworth being one of the first families in that township.

About fifteen months ago she suffered the loss of her daughter, Mrs. Jas. Pogue, with whom she lived and was most tenderly cared for. About fifteen years ago her other daughter, Mrs. F. Alders, of Bobcaygeon, died and left three children to the care of their grandmother and aunt, Mrs. Jas. Pogue. After the death of Mrs. Pogue her husband so arranged with his brother Andrew and his wife, who came to reside with him, and help care for the aged invalid lady, now deceased. The only immediate relatives of Mrs. Weese now surviving are the daughter of Mrs. Jas. Pogue, and the three children of Mrs. Alders.

The funeral took place on Friday last to the Minden cemetery in charge of Rev. J. M. Whyte of the Methodist church, in absence of an English church minister. The pall bearers were four of her neighbors, Messrs. J. H. and Geo. Graham, H. Messalls and T. Ransom.

On Thursday the citizens of Minden village were shocked to hear of the death of Ralph Malachi Campbell at the age of 18 years, 3 months and 27 days. He was the second son of Mr. Malachi Campbell. He had been working as an apprentice in Mr. Fry's Blacksmith shop in Carnarvon. With the exception of a bad cold, he was in good health, and on Friday last came from Carnarvon to play hockey with Minden team. During the game he had the misfortune to get his face so badly cut that he left the ice.

On Saturday he was driving a team for Mr. A. E. Stinson as usual. On Sunday afternoon he drove with Archdeacon Warren to Gelert and Kimmonat, returning to Minden in the evening. Before daylight on Monday morning following he was very ill with what proved to be a very severe case of pneumonia, from which he died, despite the efforts of medical practitioners. Among the wreaths on his coffin was a handsome one from the Minden hockey club, of white roses and lily of the valley. A tiny hockey stick and the initials of the club, "M. H. C.," in brass, in the centre. He leaves to mourn his loss his father, two sisters and four brothers. The sisters are Misses Margaret and Eva, both of Minden, and the brothers Messrs. Thomas, John George and William, all of whom were present at the funeral but Thomas, who is in a lumber camp so far away he could not be here in time for the funeral. The pall bearers were six of his young friends and some of the members of the Hockey Club, W. Sox, Walter Welch, F. Small, F. Armstrong, W. Noice.

TWENTY-FINE HAVE BEEN ARRESTED AND IT IS RUMORED THAT A PLOT HAS BEEN DISCOVERED OF AN ATTEMPT ON THE LIVES OF THE KING AND QUEEN DURING THE PROCESSION OF PARLIAMENT.

LITTLE BRITAIN, JAN. 25.—OUR VILLAGE WAS THE SCENE OF A DISTRESSING ACCIDENT ON MONDAY WHEN MISS ELIZABETH HENDERSON, ONE OF THE OLDEST RESIDENTS OF MARIPOSA, FELL DOWN STAIRS IN THE RESIDENCE OF HER SISTER-IN-LAW, WITH WHOM SHE WAS LIVING.

THE UNFORTUNATE LADY, WHO WAS AGED 84 YEARS, WAS ALONE AT THE TIME, MRS. JANUARY SESSION COUNTY COUNCIL HEADS OF DIFFERENT COMMITTEES

Tuesday, Jan. 24th. This afternoon the County Council met for the first time of the January session, all the Councillors being present. Among them were eight new members, five from the County and three from Lindsay.

The election for Warden then took place, the first series showing Messrs. Callan and Michael leaders. The second vote, however, placed Mr. Callan ahead and the third also but he did not poll the required ten votes.

Again the ballots were taken, and still no election, although every councillor present had received a few votes during the contest. The last vote made Mr. Callan Warden for 1911 by a sweeping majority.

A small committee were suggested on motion of Messrs. Vrooman and Lewis to appoint the standing committees for 1911 and the Council adjourned for ten minutes to allow them to execute their duties.

Peter Hawkins will be Chairman of the standing committee on Finance and Assessment.

Mr. Graham holds a similar position on the Roads and Bridges Committee.

The County Property Committee will be presided over by Dr. Vrooman, while Mr. Mulligan will be Chairman of the Committee on Education. Dr. Sims is Chairman of the Printing Committee for this year.

The appointments to office chair will be occupied by Mr. Michael. Numerous communications were read, giving an inkling of the business to be dealt with by the Council before adjourning.

The documents were referred to their appropriate standing committee. Various motions were made asking the Committee on appointments to office to report the names of those they would recommend to fill positions vacant on the Board of Management of the House of Refuge, the Omamee High School Trustee board, the Lindsay Collegiate board, besides the vacancy of auditor of County accounts and auditor of administration of justice.

Adjournment was made until 1.30 p.m. on Wednesday, the morning being engaged with an inspection of the County buildings.
