

TWENTY-FINE HAVE BEEN ARRESTED AND IT IS RUMORED THAT A PLOT HAS BEEN DIS-COVERED OF AN ATTEMPT ON THE LIVES OF THE KING AND QUEEN DURING THE PROCESSION OF PARLIAMENT.

### LADY KILLED AT LITTLE BRITAIN BY FALLING DOWN A STAIRS

LITTLE BRITAIN, JAN. 25 .- OUR VILLAGE WAS THE SCENE OF A DISTRESSING ACCIDENT ON MONDAY WHEN MISS ELIZABETH HENDERSON, ONE OF THE OLDEST RESIDENTS OF MARIPOSA, FELL DOWN STAIRS IN THE RESIDENCE OF HER SISTER-IN-LAW. WITH WHOM SHE WAS LIVING.
