PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO FAIR DIRECTORS

The following is the Presidents, report read at the meeting of the South Victoria Agricultural Society Thursday last:—

To the members of the South Victoria Agricultural Society: Gentlemen.—In presenting my report for the past year it is a great pleasure to be able to state that our Society has advanced, and from a financial point of view we should feel very grateful, having excelled all other years in the history of the institution. Although we have been making advances in nearly every line, that of agriculture has been most prominent, but being situated in a district that is second to none in the Dominion we should not feel satisfied even yet, as there are great possibilities for us along this line. You will be pleased to know that the gate receipts were \$600 more than last year. The number of entries, however, was 700 less and this caused a reduction in entrance fees of \$100. The reason we attribute to this was that the Dominion elections were held on the first day of the fair.

We purchased 1 1/2 acres of land adjoining our property on the south side which cost us \$300 and on this built a much needed new horse barn 34 x 100. The grounds were improved, buildings painted, and altogether, including new stable, repairs new entrance, and improvements we spent about \$1,250. There is still a balance to our credit in the bank of \$428.

The management of the South Victoria Agricultural Society tender their sincere thanks to the County Council, the Council of the Town of Lindsay, the citizens and supporters generally, as well as the railroad and steamboat officials for their assistance in helping to make the fair of 1911 a grand success, and trust that the management of next year may be accorded the same generous support as has been extended to us.

BANISH ALL LIQUOR IN DRY DISTRICTS

An amendment to the Brewers and Distillers' License Act was asked for yesterday by a deputation from Strathroy, Midland, Bowmanville and Leamington, who waited on the provincial secretary. The deputation want to make it illegal to store intoxicating liquors for sale or delivery in local option districts. Rev. T. Albert Moore, secretary of the Temperance and Moral Reform Association, introduced the deputation. Among those present were Rev. W.

H. Graham, J. W. Cameron, and John Milliken, of Strathroy; Rev. A. Hamilton and Norman Pearson, of Leamington; Messrs. J. J. Mason and F. A. Haddy, of Bowmanville.

J. W. Cameron said the delivery of liquor in Strathroy made it cheaper to get liquor than before local option came into effect, because they were able to get it now in a retail way at wholesale prices. Sir James promised the government's consideration.

TRENT OFFICIAL HAS RESIGNED
