MOYER WAS WOUNDED.

MUST WAIT THREE WEEKS.

No Immediate Change Expected in Cancer Patient's Health.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 23.—There has been no marked change for the better as yet in the condition of Congressman Bremner, who is undergoing the radium treatment for cancer at Dr. Howard Kelly's sanitarium, on the most extensive scale ever attempted.

No correct prediction as to the curable effects of the treatment can be made under three or possibly four weeks. Owing to the malignant growth in Bremner being near the heart his condition is at all times critical, and as Dr. Kelly has observed in commenting upon the case the Congressman's nerve alone has kept him up. Congressman Bremner's case is the greatest in magnitude that has ever been subjected to the radium test.

Cook Started a Strike.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Dec. 23.—Because Robt. Mackay, chief chef on the steamship Tyrolia, which docked Saturday, refused to cook for the firemen on the voyage from Trieste because he considered it out of his department and because eleven men in the steward's department of the steamer went on strike for the Saturday half-holiday and refused to work, Captain P. Carey gave them into charge of the police as soon as the ship docked. They were arrested and remanded to jail by Police Magistrate Ridehalgh.

Will Admit Women.

BERNE, Dec. 23.—The Synod of the Protestant Church of the Canton of Neuchatel, Switzerland, by a vote of 73 to 22, has decided to admit women to the faculty of theology. This means that in the future women who take the theological course at the university will be entitled equally with men to become pastors in this canton. Two years ago the Synod of Grisons took the same step and now has a woman pastor, the only one in Switzerland.

RUMPUS RIGHT OFF.

New Croatian Parliament Quarrels Over Its Next Meeting.

AGRAM, Croatia, Dec. 23.—The Neo-Croatian Diet was formally opened yesterday and was informally adjourned after a brief and riotous session because of the inability of the members to agree peacefully on a date for the next meeting. Dr. Mileuonic, a member of the Opposition, who presided by right of seniority, named next Monday as the day of meeting. This, however, provoked such angry protests that he hastily vacated the chair in favor of Deputy Taskan, a member of the Government party, who ordered that the House should meet again at night.

Several members of the Opposition rushed to the platform and tried to drag him from the chair. His colleagues hastened to his assistance. Blows were exchanged and the fighting soon spread to the floor of the House. The deputies finally vacated the place, finding that it was impossible to transact business.

In accordance with Deputy Taskan's decision that the Diet reassemble Saturday night, Mileuonic and his friends were already in possession of the chair, but did not attempt to open the sitting. He read the newspapers and conversed with friends. This continued until 7.30 o'clock when a quaeator appeared and declared that as Mileuonic was not discharging his duties of the president, Taskan would like to take the chair. Amid a deafening roar on the part of the Opposition, Deputy Taskan advanced and took a position in front of the tribune, but the chairman declined to move. Taskan verified the credentials of some of the members amid a tumult, and the sitting had to be suspended.

When the sitting was resumed at 9 o'clock in the evening, Mileuonic still occupied the chair, which he had not left in the interval. Taskan tried to begin the business of the House, but was greeted with an inferno of noise, the Opposition blowing trumpets, beating the covers of typewriting machines and shrieking insulting epithets. The rival presidents produced bells which they continuously sounded.

SATURDAY SESSION COURT OF REVISION

An adjourned meeting of the Court of Revision was held on Saturday evening when the frontages and assessments of the following granolithic sidewalks were confirmed:

- Francis-st, south side, from Victoria Ave to Sussex-st. Mill-st, west side from Melbourne to Durham. Melbourne-st, north side, from Mill to St. Lawrence. The costs of the different granolithic walks will be adjusted to the new Local Improvement Act.

HORSESHOE HUNT CLUB'S MODEL RULES

When Hon. E. J. Davis, of Newmarket, went to the wilds of Haliburton with the Horseshoe Hunt Club recently he fully expected to shoot a deer. There were eleven in the party, and that number of deer were killed, but the former Provincial Secretary of Ontario was not successful in securing one. He had, however, a rather unique experience. Not having fired his rifle since leaving camp the year before, on reaching the headquarters of the club, Mr. Davis put a small mark on a stump, and then paced off eighty yards. He fired a practice shot, and the result was so satisfactory that he considered that he was ready to slay any animal the following morning. He hunted for eleven days with great care and patience on the runways, and during the whole time never had an opportunity to blaze away at a deer. He returned home having fired only once during the whole hunt—that practice shot. If this were baseball the fans would say that the breaks of the game were all against the former Provincial Secretary. There is, perhaps, no better organized deer hunting club in Ontario than the "Horseshoe" which is composed of leading citizens of various towns. They have a complete set of rules, prepared after careful consideration and long experience, and all the members are compelled to rigidly observe them. No intoxicating liquors are permitted in the camp; no member of the club is allowed to fire his rifle in the woods until he is absolutely certain at what he is firing; neither will the club allow a member to bring his rifle into the house at night with a cartridge either in the barrel or the magazine. Every rifle must be absolutely empty before it can cross the threshold of the hunting club, and no cartridges are allowed to be placed in the rifles on going out until after they are outside the camp. There are many other rules, but these show the club believes in safety first, and were all other hunting organizations as well managed and carefully directed those accidents which so often mar the pleasure and enjoyment of deer stalking would be avoided.—Toronto Star Weekly.

Butchers up Against it

That the butchers are up against a hard proposition in face of the present prices of meat is quite evident. A wholesale price list from the Harris Abattoir Co. gives an insight on the prices the butchers have to pay. Steers and heifers in the carcass were quoted 13 to 14 1/2, choice cuts going as high as 15 1/2 to 16. Cows were quoted 11 1/2 to 15 and bulls 10 to 12 1/2.
