RELIEF TOMORROW.
 Montreal Hopes for Cessation of Her
 Water Famine.
 MONTREAL, Dec. 29.—While the
 water situation here remains prac-
 tically the same, there are hopeful
 prospects that the citizens will have
 water by Tuesday, according to a
 statement made by Controller God-
 frey last night. All the excavation
 work considered necessary for the
 placing of the steel tubing has been
 completed, and the last section will
 be delivered to-day. Until the break
 in the intake is remedied, the city will
 have 150 vehicles distributing water
 to the places and people not already
 temporarily reached by the arrange-
 ment with the Montreal Water &
 Power Co.
 A number of churches were affect-
 ed. At the First Baptist Church a
 baptism had to be postponed owing
 to the impossibility of obtaining suf-
 ficient water to fill the large tank
 used for the ceremony of total im-
 mersion.
