RESULT OF ACRE PROFIT COMPETITION

Extensive farming had a conclusive demonstration in the awards made in an "Acre Profit Competition" conducted by the Ontario Department of Agriculture, during the past summer. This idea of the Department is quite new and worked through the District Representative. All students taking the six weeks' short course were eligible for the competition. The contestants selected the kind of crop they desired to grow by vote. The crop chosen in Victoria was silage corn. The limit of cultivation was one acre. Emphasis was placed upon the net profit rather than on the yield. Every effort was made to put the contestants on an equal basis. Five dollars was charged for rent of land and labor at ten cents an hour with ten cents extra for each horse. The actual cost of commercial fertilizer was put down and barnyard manure at fifty cents a load, which is less

OAKWOOD'S NEW SCHOOL OPENED

Structure is a Credit to Mariposa's Capital There was a good sized attendance present Tuesday afternoon at the opening of the new school at Oakwood, an event which has been looked forward to with interest. Among those from Lindsay who attended were Dr. A. E. Vrooman, M. P. P., Mr. Thos. Stewart, Ex-Chairman, of the Board of Education, Dr. White, Inspector W. H. Stevens, Inspector G. E. Broderick, G. H. Wilson, T. A. Kirkconnell, Principal of the Collegiate Institute. THE CHAIRMAN. Inspector Stevens, at the request of the School Board, took the chair. The first number of the program was a solo by Miss Cameron, who was heartily applauded. Inspector Stevens said he had never had better support by a School Board or worked with a body with better satisfaction. There was no need to praise the building. It would speak for itself. It was up to date in every particular. E. G. LYTLE. Mr. E. G. Lytle, Chairman of the School Board, said there is nothing strengthens the arm of a School Board like the support of the people. The Board's services have been given freely. The children would benefit from improved school conditions. A great deal of credit was due Inspector Stevens, who did so much to bring the school to what it is—a credit to the township and county. J. F. BRASS. Mr. J. F. Brass, one of the trustees, stated that he had looked forward to having this opening for some time. He was glad to have such a beautiful school in which to give boys and girls the best of training. The expense would be out up willingly. Inspector Stevens then spoke of another trustee, Mr. Graham, who had done great work, but did not wish to speak. THE ARCHITECT. Mr. Taylor, the architect and building, said he was pleased to have the work finished. He had built not only this school, but the Methodist Church across the way. He attended the old grammar school here, which was opened sixty years ago. He was glad to have gotten along so harmoniously with all concerned, and was pleased to do all he could to help along good affairs. This is the twelfth school he had built. AN OLD OAKWOOD BOY. Dr. White, of Lindsay, who was an old Oakwood boy, was the next speaker. He told how glad he was to be present. He was an Oakwood Old boy, having attended here twenty or so years ago. He named over a number of those who were at school with him. This was a very important event in the annals of the village. The school and church go side by side in the march of civilization. In Ontario education is well advanced, but it is not as practical as it should be. It should prepare the boys and girls for after life. Dr. White advised the people to support the school well and get the best possible teachers, not aiming at getting the cheapest ones. Children should not attend school till seven or eight years of age, and then under teachers of noble character. Homework should not be given too much. He paid a tribute to Mr. G. B. Rennie, the teacher, who has been with the Oakwood school for many years. DR. VROOMAN. Dr. A. E. Vrooman, M. P. P., was the next speaker. He reiterated the congratulations in regard to the school, with its many good features. He spoke of the old time school he once attended. It was a square, single room, built of logs. Good ventilation was given by the chinks between the logs. He remembered the first day he attended and the first lesson. First impressions in childhood always last. The schoolman who he later knew well, he thought was very tall because he was small and had to look up so high. He was only as high as her knee. There have been great improvements since that day. In building this school they had built for all time and not for a few years. The school and home are the two most important institutions of the country with the home first.
