The great bonspiel is on, and the success of the big event is now assured. From all points of the compass the exponents of the roaring game have congregated, and the town is in possession of a jovial, good natured and enthusiastic gathering. The crack curlers of the Dominion are here for the event, and the hotel lobbies, the central headquarters, as well as the two rinks, are alive with be-ribboned knights of the besom and stone, and the scene presented is an animated one.

The local Reception Committee had a busy time of it meeting the local trains and extending a right royal welcome, but they were equal to the occasion, and the visiting curlers soon realized that they were in the best curling town on the map.

One of the features of the bonspiel this morning was the game between O'Connor of Lindsay and O'Connor of Toronto. The game was contested stubbornly throughout. L. V. O'Connor, of Lindsay, of Dominion reputation, fell before his namesake this morning after a hard fought battle. It looked like victory till right at the end, when a run of hard luck put him down on the last end. There was a big crowd watching from the edges of the rink, and every stone was watched breathlessly. The fortunes of war, however, were not with the Lindsay man, and great skill and hard work brought the Toronto O'Connor out on top.

OLD LINDSAY BOY.

An old Lindsay boy who is warmly welcomed back to town is Mr. Ross Harstone who comes here with the Rennie rink from Toronto. Ross is looking just about the same as ever and shows as much interest in the grand old game as he ever did.

TRAINS LATE.

Owing to the cold nearly all the trains were late last night, even on the main line, for it was found impossible to keep up a good head of steam in the engines. Many curlers missed their connections on that account, but all were able to get here today.

BUSY AT HEADQUARTERS.

The curling headquarters presented a very busy scene last night from nine o'clock till nearly midnight. Every train brought in a large number of the bonspiel visitors and nearly everybody made it a point to drop in at headquarters to find out when they were scheduled to play and get any other information that was going. Many friends met and renewed acquaintances which had taken place at previous bonspiels in other places.

ONLY ITALIAN CURLER.

Probably the only Italian curler in Canada is Chas. Mattaini of the Fergus Curling Club, who are attending the bonspiel. Mons. Mattaini plays lead for one of Fergus' best rinks, skipped by J. G. Wilson and

is spoken of in high terms by his fellow curlers as a good sport and amiable companion. This one of the Fergus rinks played at nine o'clock this morning against R. B. Rice's Queen City rink on ice No. 8.

OLDEST CANADIAN CLUB.

One of the oldest if not the oldest curling club in Canada today is the Fergus Curling Club, of Fergus, Ont. Their representative rinks arrived in Lindsay last night and reported immediately at the bonspiel headquarters. The club was organized in 1834, and therefore is eighty years old this year. They sent two rinks to the bonspiel, skipped by T. J. Hamilton and J. G. Wilson. The men on the rinks are Capt. J. Dick, P. McGregor, Jas. Anderson, Chas. Mattaini, J. H. Steele and Ed. Stone. On the occasion of the Fergus Club's seventy-fifth birthday they held a big bonspiel in 1909 at which were many leading Ontario clubs. Many clubs look back with pleasure on the event.

J. RENNIE.

Many curlers become well known all over the province by their good playing, but there are always two or three names that stand head and shoulders above the rest and become famous over the whole continent wherever there is ice. Rochon and Braden, of Winnipeg, and Rennie, of Toronto, are examples, par excellence of this.

Mr. Rennie who, with his rink, arrived in town last night, has attended every bonspiel of note even into Western Canada and the curling news of the sporting editions is not complete unless there is some reference to his name. Mr. Rennie takes a keen enjoyment out of these bonspiels and has formed many fast friendships all over the country.

Many Lindsay people have had the pleasure of meeting him previously.

CAN COUNCIL REFUSE LICENSE?

Spirited Discussion Over Moving Picture House

Can the town council refuse to issue a license to a moving picture house?

This is the problem which confronts the town council and which evoked considerable discussion last night.

It appears that Messrs Pappas and Clayton are negotiating for the purchase of a local site, which will be converted into a theaterum. Mr. W. Roenigk feels that two picture houses are sufficient for Lindsay, and if a third was allowed to come in, it would kill the business.

Dep-Reeve Warren said that Mr. W. H. Roenigk had spoken to him in reference to another picture house which it was proposed to start in Lindsay. Mr. Warren said the town had enough moving picture houses. Both Mr. Roenigk and Mr. Edwards were able to make things go, but another house would go to the wall. Personally he was opposed to granting a license.

His Worship Mayor Beal said the council could not withhold the license and it would be unfair to do so. If a man wanted to sell his property would we say no, you cannot sell, or if another dry goods store wished to open up, could we stop it? The more amusement for the people the better.

Ald. Irvine—You are drawing a wrong conclusion. We are deriving a certain revenue from the local men and we should protect them.

Dep-Reeve Warren—If you are going to turn places on Kent-st into amusement centres, you will put those in business to the wall. If we license

ed another pool room or barroom, you would start quite a row.

Mayor Beal—If 50 pedlars came here you would have to give them licenses.

Mr. Thos. Stewart, on behalf of Mr. Roenigk, asked that the council pass a new resolution covering picture shows. The present bylaw was not a good one. The committee should bring in a new bylaw and in the meantime suspend the granting of licenses.

Ald. Baker—Would you raise the license?

Mr. Stewart—You can do as you like.

Ald. Baker—Could the council refuse parties a license? If they can't do that, they can't do very much.

Mr. Stewart was not prepared to answer the question.

Ald. Chambers—I can't see for the life of me why we can't do as we like.

Ald. Clark—We will have better picture shows if we had three or five houses.

Mayor Beal said that he had several appeals to him in opposition to the council's interference with additional amusement.

Dep-Reeve Smale said he believed that the town had authority to grant a license, it had authority to refuse it.

Ald. Chambers said he felt the council had authority to do as it pleased regarding issuing licenses. They could refuse a circus a license and felt that they could do likewise with any other request. In regard to the purchase of the Gough corner for a picture show, Ald. Chambers said it would be much better for the town to have Mr. Gough's store than a picture house. A bylaw had been framed with a view to keeping children off the streets. A moving picture show would have a tendency to draw the children out. It would be much better to have a reputable business house on the corner than an amusement house. The former brought money into the town and the latter took it out.

Ald. Jordan said it was unfair to put a barricade around any business. Let all those who have reputable lines of business come in and do business.

Deputy-Reeve Warren said that if another barroom was opened in Lindsay, there would be a howl on the part of some of the council members.

Ald. Clark—You're off the subject. If Mr. Gough wishes to sell his property he has a right to do so. If a picture show comes in, it is another question. Dep-Reeve Warren was altogether too fast and should hold his seat. Let me talk, Mr. Warren. You will be up ten times to my once.

Dep-Reeve Warren—I will say something too, when I get up.

Ald. Clark—If we have a chance to get a modern building we will naturally get good features.

Ald. Sims—The motion is all right. The question to consider is the regulation. Get your bylaw in order and then you can see how far we can go.

The following resolutions were adopted. Moved by Ald. Smale and McWatters that a committee consisting of Messrs Clarke, Irvine and Warren confer with the Town Solicitor and bring in a bylaw re local amusements within seven days, and that no further licenses be issued pending the report of committee.

MOVED TO BURN.

Dep-Reeve Warren and Ald. Jordan introduced a resolution instructing the clerk to discontinue the temporary loan advertisement in the local papers and that no more money be accepted.

"We have money to burn," said the Mayor.

The council did not wish to take unfair advantage of any person, but would be fair to all applicants. The resolution carried.

Ald. Baker then introduced a resolution, which was adopted, appointing Messrs. Baker, Irvine and Nicholls a committee to consider all applications.

RAILWAYS HAD THEIR TROUBLES

The railways have had other things to contend with besides cold the last few days. Last night's G. T. R. 6.23 train for Toronto was delayed a couple of hours on account of a car being off the track between Millbrook and Peterboro.

This morning's C. P. R. main line trains were also delayed by a engine blowing out a cylinder head the other side of Peterboro and a new engine had to be brought up from Havelock before the train could proceed.
