**PETERBORO SEEKS SENATE REPRESENTATION**

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Peterborough, Jan. 18.—In indication that the Borden Government will lose no time in filling the Senate vacancy caused by the death of Hon. Senator Cox, Mayor Buller received a telegram from Mr. J. H. Burnham, M.P., urging immediate action if the city was to press its claims effectively to a city representative in Parliament. Accordingly last night the Mayor called a special meeting of the City Council, the Board of Trade and citizens. The City Council passed a resolution asserting Peterborough's claim to a Senatorship, and unanimously placing the name of James Kennedy, ex-M.P., in nomination for the honor. The Board of Trade and citizens' meeting adopted a similar resolution and recommendation. A civic and citizens' deputation will go to Ottawa on Tuesday to press upon the Government the claims of Peterborough to Senate representation.

A VETERAN.

Skip George Rice, of Oshawa, uncle of Mrs. Thos. Wilkinson, of Lindsay, is the oldest curler participating in the bonspiel. He has passed the seventy summers, but is just as active on the ice as a sixteen-year-old. He is an all-round sport, curling in the winter, hunting in the fall, besides playing cricket in the summer. His game last night with Orillia, in which he made a number of phenomenal shots was watched by a big crowd, who cheered the veteran lustily whenever a good play was made.

**FLAVELLE-THAUBURN CONTEST.**

The fastest of the Blue Ribbon games was the Flavelle-Thauburn Contest run off on ice 10 at the Lindsay rink. The water on the ice as well as the heave in the center of this sheet which the club have practically abandoned made the play particularly hard and both skips rushed the ends through as fast as possible. They finished playing their whole twelve ends after less than two hours work. Some of the other rinks took three hours to play eight ends. Flavelle took the lead in scoring on the first end but afterward the Brampton rink scored steadily with one exception till the last three ends which were claimed by Lindsay. By the score 10-9 for Thauburn the Lindsay men almost saved themselves from defeat.

**THE BIRKS TROPHY**

The Birks Trophy, the magnificent vase which the ten local rinks won from the All Comers last night, was the gift of Henry Birks & Sons, Montreal. The trophy has been on exhibit, with the other prizes in Dundas & Flavelles' show window and stood out prominently and pre-eminently among the other fine trophies.

The handsome trophy is in the form of a Grecian vase with acanthus leaf and festoon decoration, mounted on an ebony base and engraved "The Birks' Trophy, Lindsay Bonspiel." The piece measures twenty-two inches over all.

The Trophy has been greatly admired by the visiting curlers, and one and all declare that it is one of the handsomest prizes ever offered for competition in curling.

The Bonspiel Committee are very much indebted to the Birks' firm for their generosity.

The Birks' Trophy will be competed for by the regular rinks of the local club as drawn up in the Curling Annual. This competition will take place in February.

**PILLGREG'S PROGRESS.**

There were only sixteen rinks entered in this contest and the Port Hope won from his opponent Wasley, of Gravenhurst. The next round he got by his opponent defaulting so that now he is in the fours after playing only one game. Two games more will finish this contest. The committee expect to have it completed this afternoon.

**FLAVELLE'S WIN.**

One of the close, exciting games this morning was between Flavelle's rink, of Lindsay, and Madden's, Orillia rink, when a score of 11-10 in favor of the popular Lindsay Skip was the result. The game was nip and tuck all through and could have been anybody's game up to the last end.

**ITH the cry of Sweep! Sweep!**

heard on every side, and excitement on each ice at such a temperature as to threaten its destruction, the battle raged at both rinks Wednesday evening as well as this morning in the Flavelle and Gillies trophy.

Nothing is talked of in town but the big bonspiel, and young and old have become inoculated with the curling spirit. The two rinks are crowded night and day with spectators, who are as much interested in the struggles as the curlers themselves.

The contests in the different competitions are narrowing down and many rinks (including a number from Lindsay) are out of the running. A feature of Thursday's games was the defeat of the "big guns" in curling—Messrs. Rennie, Rochoon and McAuley.

This evening excitement will reign supreme, in the great Blue Ribbon event—the all comers' struggle—when ten Lindsay rinks will tattle with a similar number from the visiting clubs. It will be a battle royal for the Birks' trophy.

**HAS TWO WINS.**

Last night's issue credited Peppiatt, of Lindsay, with a win and a loss in place of two wins. Peppiatt was still in the running for both trophies at noon today and marking up scores on the good side of the layer against rinks with high reputation.

**SKIP GAGE OUT.**

Tom Gage lost a hard luck game last night to Skip Rice of the Toronto Granites in a 9-3 score. It was in the Gillies competition, and the local quartette fought with the tenacity of drowning men.

**ORILLIA'S TRIUMPH.**

The Great Brock-McAuley, who came to Lindsay bonspiel with the trophies of the St. Thomas 'spiel in his belt, struck a snag last night, when he bumped into the Orillia rink under Skip Hinds. A big crowd watched the game, which was a hummer. The northern curlers played a cool, heady game. Their shots were put where they counted most and they deserved to win. Score 13-11.

**FALL OF THE O'CONNOR.**

Skip Peppiatt still retains his rabbit's foot. Last night in the Gillies Trophy, he walked away with a game from O'Connor of the Toronto Aberdeens. Score 13-8. This is the O'Connor who walloped our own "Larry" in the Flavelle competition.

**McFADDEN DOWN.**

Skip McFadden, the "Wall Paper King" met another defeat yesterday. It was in the Gillies competition and his opponent was Blaylock, of Toronto. Score 13-9.

**O'CONNOR'S GREAT WIN.**

While Peppiatt was busy administering defeat to O'Connor, of Toronto, Lindsay's crack curler, L. V. O'Connor, disposed of Skip Wilson of Fergus in a 11-9 score. It was a great game to watch. Wilson had just emerged triumphant from a gruelling battle of 13 ends with Brampton and was a foeman worthy of his steel. The game was a ding dong one all the way through, but the splendid work of the local rink was of the gilt edged kind, and was well worth seeing. The game was in the Gillies competition.

It looked one time as if it might be a Fergus game as Wilson was one up. On the last end though O'Connor redeemed himself and made up the requisite score to trim him.

**SKIP LITTLE WINS.**

Rev. Father F. J. O'Sullivan, of Port Hope, and formerly of Lindsay, went down before Skip Geo. Little at Peel-st rink Wednesday afternoon. Score 14-7. A big crowd watched the contest, which was replete with many fine plays.

**GOOD GAME TO WATCH.**

One of the most interesting games played in the midnight hours last night was between Rice, of Toronto, and Gage, of Lindsay, in the Gillies Trophy, Gage going down to defeat by a single shot gotten in the last end. The battle was nip and tuck all the way till at the finish of the eleventh end the two rinks were tied. On the twelfth end Rice's lead put both his stones through. His second, however, placed one rock on the button and then guarded. The other men played a protective game and Gage could not dislodge the Toronto man from the tee. Final score. Rice 9, Gage 8.

**TORONTO RINKS CLASH.**

Two crack Toronto rinks met last night and fought it out. Empringham of the Aberdeens with a score of 13 trimmed, Keith of the Lakeviews whose score was 12. This game was worth watching but too late for most people.

**RENNIE'S DEFEAT.**

It was a great event last night when Smith, of the Hamilton Victorias, put it over the famous Rennie rink of the Queen City in a furious game of a dozen ends. Score—Smith 11, Rennie 7.

The victory for the Hamilton Victoria skip is all the greater because of the fact that previous to this bonspiel he and his men have never had a work out together. His own rink was unable to come, so Mr. Smith came alone and picked up a rink of Lindsay men. They are playing a remarkable game together and have not yet been defeated in any competition.

**SKIP BEALL'S DEFEAT.**

Skip George Beall's rink, which had been playing a fine game all along, fell before Cannington (Dobson) last night by a 7-10 score. The local quartette fought to the last ditch.

**HOLDS THE RECORD.**

The record by score of the bonspiel to date is held by Skip Beattie of Seaforth, who piled up twenty-two today against the Cannington rink's three. The game was not as uninteresting as the score looks nor as one-sided.

**LIKE NIGHT GAMES.**

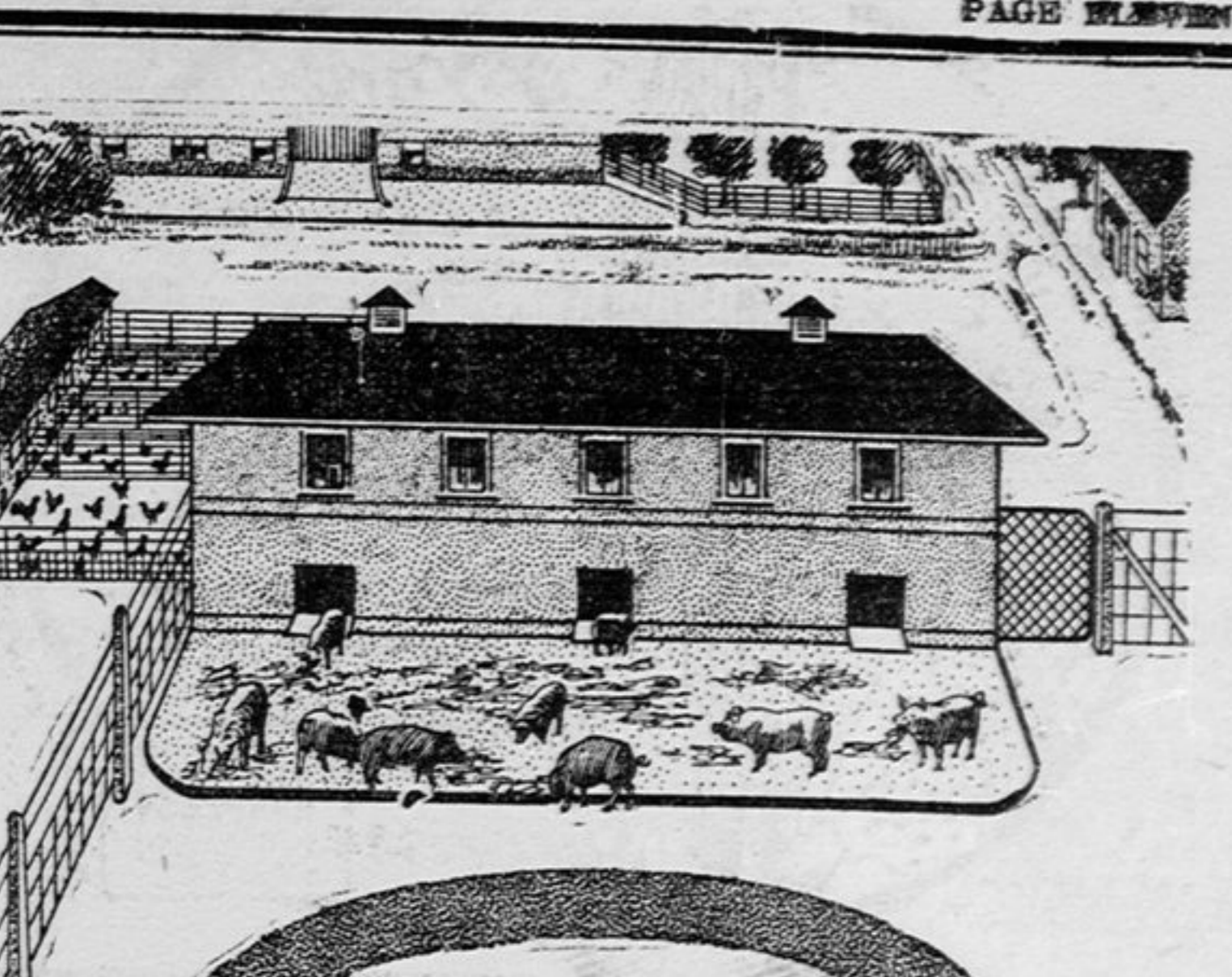
Some of the Toronto rinks have stated a preference for playing night games, believing that they do better work than in the day time. M. A. Rice's rink, of Toronto, is one of these. This suits the committee first rate as most rinks do not like being put on the "night shift."

**ABOUT CURLING STONES.**

People are wondering these days why the curlers are so trusting with their property. The man remarked they must believe implicitly in the honesty of Lindsay citizens for more curling stones are left outside the rinks on the street than inside.

The real reason is that the stones are much better to curl with if very cold, and the outside air is therefore better. A rink using stones which have been in a hot express car all day is having handicapped when playing against one whose curling stones are below freezing in temperature. The stones will hold heat for many hours at a time, and become sluggish on the ice.

Anyway, anybody who would lug a hundred pounds of polished stone home for decorative purposes deserves either a medal or a straitjacket, and will probably get the latter sooner or later.
