

their property. The man remarked they must believe implicitly in the honesty of Lindsay citizens for more curling stones are left outside the rinks on the street than inside.

The real reason is that the stones are much better to curl with if very cold, and the outside air is therefore better. A rink using stones which have been in a hot express car all day is heaving handicapped playing against one whose curling stones are below freezing in temperature. The stones will hold heat for many hours at a time, and become sluggish on the ice,

Anyway, anybody who would lug a hundred pounds of polished stone home for decorative purposes deserves either a medal or a straitjacket, and will probably get the latter sooner or later.
