CELEBRATING HER 98th BIRTHDAY

Mrs. J. H. Hopkins, sr., is celebrating the 98th anniversary of her birthday today at the residence her son, Mr. J. H. Hopkins,

Cambridge-st. Mrs. Hopkins was born in Arundel, Sussex, England, in 1816, where she resided until 1859, leaving that for Canada with her husband, who had been appointed manager of the Bank of Upper Canada branch in Lindsay. The bank building was situated in the house now occupied by Mr. F. R. Wilford, and in those days the main business section of the town was in that neighborhood. It was the only brick structure in town and was looked upon as the very finest in the builders' art. Mr. Hopkins died in 1.72. Mrs. Hopkins recollects the great Lindsay fire 1861 and says that in those days man considered himself lucky if were allowed to pay off an \$100 note by giving one hundred cords of best body beech and maple.

Mrs. Hopkins is wonderfully vigorous for her age, being able to write in a clear clean hand, and read the daily papers. She is receiving the congratulations of her numerous friends today, who are delighted to see her in such good health and spirits.
