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CELEBRATING HER 98th BIRTHDAY

Mrs. J. H. Hopkins, sr., is celebrating the 98th anniversary of her birthday today at the residence of her son, Mr. J. H. Hopkins, 50 Cambridge-st.

Mrs. Hopkins was born in Arundel, Sussex, England, in 1816, where she resided until 1859, leaving that year for Canada with her husband, who had been appointed manager of the Bank of Upper Canada branch in Lindsay. The bank building was situated in the house now occupied by Mr. F. R. Wilford, and in those days the main business section of the town was that neighborhood. It was the only brick structure in town and was looked upon as the very finest in the builders' art. Mr. Hopkins died in 1872. Mrs. Hopkins recalls the great Lindsay fire of 1861 and says that in those days a man considered himself lucky if he were allowed to pay off an \$100 note by giving one hundred cords of best body beech and maple.

Mrs. Hopkins is wonderfully vigorous for her age, being able to write in a clear clean hand, and read the daily papers. She is receiving the congratulations of her numerous friends today, who are delighted to see her in such good health and spirits.

MIDLAND HAD \$70,000 FIRE

Midland, Jan. 15—At 1 o'clock this morning fire broke out in the Ingram block at the corner of King street and Dominion avenue, which threatened to wipe out a good portion of the business centre of Midland. The firemen fought the fire for several hours before getting it under control. The branch bank of British North America is a mass of ruins, but the vault is still intact. The cause of the fire is unknown. The losses will amount to about \$70,000, almost entirely covered by insurance as follows: Ingram block, \$15,000; McLeod's \$6,000; Bank of British North America \$3,000; Dr. R. B. Harvie, dentist, \$2,000; W. A. Finlayson, barrister, \$1,500; Longpicking Association \$1,000; Simeco Power Co., \$5,000; Town Clerk's office, \$3,000; Water & Light Co., \$2,000; Singer Sewing Machine store, Arthur W. Bell, \$2,000; Armstrong Bros. & Frank, electricians and plumbers, \$3,000; Angus C. McNabb, \$2,000; Canada Express Co., \$250; D. A. Fowler, jeweller, \$500; Miss C. M. McLeod, milliner, \$500; Aikens & Co., tailors \$3,500.
