To Double-track The Midland R'y
Well Established Report That Work Will Commence in Early Spring.
The Grand Trunk Railway is going to double-track the Midland Division, according to the Ottawa News-Letter. An official of the Company states that that paper the other day that it had been intended to double track from Port Hope to Midland in a year or two, but recently the management decided to proceed with the work just as soon as spring opens. It is intended, he says, to have almost a new right of way from Port Hope to Midland, all the curves being eliminated, and much of the present roadbed being abandoned. The intention is to have a straight line with as little grade as possible and to make this the line for grain traffic. At some places forty feet of filling will be required to reduce the roadbed to a proper grade.

And every farmer can help in this great work simply by buying blended flours whenever the "flour barrel is empty." The farmers themselves will benefit by getting more money for their wheat. Stockmen and dairymen will share in the profits by paying less for bran and shorts. As is well known, the reason these feedstuffs cost so much now is because our local mills do not grind as much grain as they should, and consequently have not the bran, etc., to sell. And finally, the whole province will benefit, because higher prices for wheat means more money for everybody.
