That where any hotel is found not possessing the requirements of the License Act, or under conviction for any infraction of the Act, the penalty prescribed should be the cancelling of the house license, and in this way succeed in accomplishing the object sought, in accordance with law and order.

Some may think this subject a dead issue that ought to be relegated to the past, (out on the contrary, it is very much alive at the present time in large centers. For instance, the federating of the temperance forces in Toronto just now, and the formulating of progressive plans on a squewhat democratic basis, will prove a powerful incentive that will make itself felt throughout the community.
