

Sensational Climax In Liquor Case

Action Will be Taken Against Mrs. James Simpson of Kimmount

There was a sensational climax in the charge against James Simpson, of Kimmount for having liquor on his premises on Jan. 11th.

The defence, in the evidence adduced, maintained that Mrs. Simpson was the owner of the house and transacted all the business.

Constable Train, who searched the house with the other officials, was recalled, and told about his search of the kitchen. The door leading to the hotel yard was locked, as well as the one leading from the hotel hall into the dining room.

Mr. McDiarmid accused the witness of being a persecutor and he appealed to the court for protection. The magistrate stated that the witness was a constable and was only doing his duty.

Constable McMullen was also recalled and told of his two visits to the Simpson house kitchen on the date of the seizure. The door was not locked the first time.

Mr. F. A. McDiarmid characterized certain portions of the license act as "unjustifiably extreme" and "stupid legislation."

Mr. Weldon argued that as long as the husband lived in the house he was the occupant whether the wife was the owner or not.

Mr. McDiarmid in reply contended that there were fatal defects in the crown case which had not been patched up.

The magistrate, in summing up, said that although he felt there was unlimited suspicion, the statement was practically uncontradicted.
