

Short Course Session Considers Seeds

Prof. Zavitz Discusses a Subject of Great Importance to Farmers

THURSDAY
The Thursday morning session of the short course proved very interesting also. A large attendance heard Prof. Zavitz speak on the best ways of growing oats and the best kinds to grow. He then took up pasture, which he said, was being added to every year by the farmers on account of scarcity of labor and the increase in the livestock industry.

Prof. Zavitz then gave a number of seed mixtures which gave good pasture for certain purposes and seasons. When the crowd had adjourned to the Academy of Music a ram belonging to Mr. W. T. Reed, of Grass Hill was placed on the stage for consideration by the score card. A most instructive hour was passed, and all learned something which they did not know before.

At twelve o'clock the meeting adjourned to meet again at half past one. Thursday afternoon Prof. Day spoke on sheep. Among those who had sheep on the stage during the afternoon were Mr. J. R. Kelly, five Shropshire ewes and one ram, T. Deyell, Mount Horeb, one Leicester ram lamb, W. T. Reid, Grass Hill, three Leicester ewes, and G. H. Mark of Little Britain three excellent Cotswold sheep with a ram.

Saturday Morning's Short Course

Road Horses Were the Subject of Discussion by Dr. Reid

The Saturday morning session of the short course was devoted to using the score card on road horses. Dr. Cowan's fine road mare, which took first prize at the Christmas fair was the animal on the stage. Dr. Reid taught his hearers many important points about this class of animal.

Saturday afternoon, the last session of the course, was also devoted to horses. A fine hackney stallion belonging to Mr. Jas. McKinnon, of Bethany, was the animal used by Dr. Reid to explain the difference between the standard bred and the carriage horse, Mr. McKinnon's hackney being a fine type of carriage horse.

After this a class of horses made up of Mr. McKinnon's hackney, Mr. Brown's brown mare and Mr. E. Stewart's bay mare. Messrs. Brown and Stewart both live near Lindsay. The class was judged and after much discussion by the various would-be horsemen, Dr. Reid settled the matter by placing Mr. McKinnon's hackney first, Mr. Stewart's mare second, and Mr. Brown's mare third.

A vote of thanks to Dr. Reid for his services was very ably moved by Mr. Wm. Thurston, of Bobcaygeon, and seconded by Mr. L. B. Davidson, of Little Britain. In presenting the motion for the approval of the class, Mr. D. A. MacKenzie, B. S. A., agricultural master at the collegiate institute, thanked the people of Victoria county for the support they had given him since taking charge of the work as district representative. His special thanks were due to those who were kind enough to bring in their stock and lay it open to criticism, just and otherwise, as the case might be. He thanked the citizens of Lindsay and especially the press of Lindsay for the hearty support they had given him throughout the course. The motion of thanks to Dr. Reid was carried unanimously.

of the whole course attended the class on draught horses at the Academy of Music. Many town people were among those present, the total crowd numbering in the neighborhood of four hundred.

Three draft geldings were the first on the stage, one of them belonging to Mr. Jas. Robertson, from just east of the town and a fine span of Mr. J. Coad's, of Oakwood. Next some agricultural horses were discussed. Three gentlemen very kindly allowed their horses to be used for the purpose. Mr. M. Caughlin, of Lindsay, owned one fine horse, Mr. Isaac Leddy two, and Mr. Robt. Deyell another. Mr. Deyell's animal, although a little under size, was of very good quality.

Two draft stallions belonging respectively to Mr. Jno. Davidson and Dr. Cowan, of Lindsay, took the attention of the audience till closing time. Dr. Reed said in closing that the quality of stock was away above the average brought before classes of this kind and reflected great credit on the farmers of Victoria county.

The Winter Fair Directors Convene

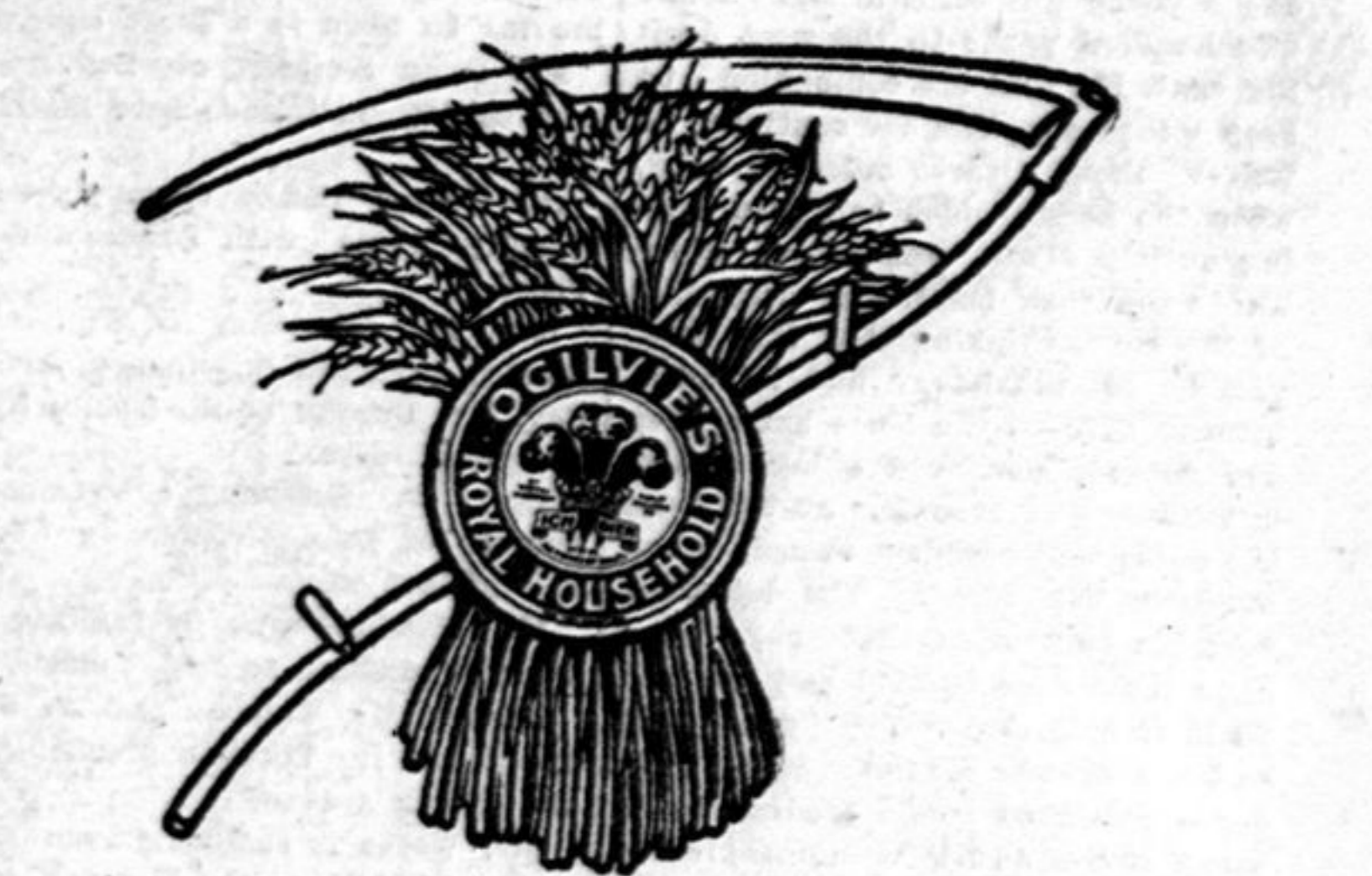
Meeting Will be Held Monday Evening to Discuss Permanent Show
